SUPERINTENDENT NOTES by Jack D. Moles

On Wednesday, January 25, we observed "I Love Public Schools Day" at Johnson County Central. This day was an unofficial undertaking statewide to recognize the great work that public schools do in our state. All of our staff

members received an "I Love Public Schools" t-shirt that was provided by the NE \checkmark PS (Nebraska Loves Public Schools) organization and the Nebraska Council of School Administrators.

As I said, this was a day to recognize the great work that is being done by our public schools systems. It is not an anti-private school observation. We have great private schools in Nebraska and I have wonderful friends and colleagues in many of them. They serve educational, cultural, religious, and family needs in our state. I have worked closely with Falls City Sacred Heart, Lourdes Central Catholic and Brownell-Talbot and have enjoyed those relationships. I have especially enjoyed working with Fr. Dunavan and Fr. Clinch at St. Andrews. St. Andrews is a wonderful educational partner for JCC. I myself am a product of private schools as I attended St. Philip Neri in Midwest City, OK and Our Lady Queen of Mercy in Montgomery, AL when I was growing up in an Air Force family.

The "I Love Public Schools" movement is partially a response to growing criticism of public schools in our nation. For many years it appeared to me that these criticisms were of schools far away in other states. To me, most of this criticism appeared to come from the press and politicians. They often used unfair or partial statistics on which to base their criticisms. I used to be able to tell peers in other states that the view of Nebraska public schools was very favorable within our state. However, we have seen increasing criticism of public schools in our own state. Sadly, much of this criticism seems to come

from some elected officials. Thus, the need from organizations such as NE PS, NCSA, the Nebraska Association of School Boards, and Nebraska State Education Association to come to the defense of public schools in Nebraska.

I am very pleased to be a part of the public school system in Nebraska. Our public schools are among the highest performing in the nation. Nebraska has some of the highest graduation rates, ACT scores, and college-going rates in the nation. The amazing thing about successes such as those is that Nebraska ranks 49th in the nation in the percent of financial support for public schools coming from the state.

One of the things that I am proud of about public schools is that we are responsible for every child that walks into our schools. Whether the student is a gifted student or a high needs Special Education student we work to provide for his/her needs. I have had the wonderful opportunity to witness and be a part of so many success stories from our kids in public schools. What we do is successful and should not be disparaged.

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Public schools are facing growing challenges every year as it appears we end up being given the duty to address a growing number of societal issues involving children. I know most of us are guilty of saying at one time or another, "We didn't have that when I was in school." Ahh, for the "good old days". The fact, though, is that these are not those "good old days". There are real issues facing our kids that make their lives much more complicated that when I was their age. Public schools are at least partially charged in addressing many of these challenges as we have been able to prove over the years that we are successful in meeting those challenges. It does, however, serve to make the work of public schools more complex. I am proud of that fact!

This will be a very interesting year in the Unicameral for public schools. There are many bills that will be considered that will deal with over-reliance on property taxes and the need to cut all taxes. Also to be considered are bills that could provide for charter schools and vouchers. While these issues may be seen as being positives by some, in most cases they pull more funds away from public schools. Some of the proposed legislation I have seen for this Unicameral session appear to do just that: divert funds from the public school to charters or vouchers.

I would encourage you to look more into the great work being done by public schools in the state. To learn more about the

work of NE PS please visit iloveps.org. I would especially encourage you to view some of the films they have produced about both the successes of public schools and the challenges facing public schools.



NEWS FROM PRINCIPAL RICK LESTER

Winter is strengthening its grip on us with snow, ice and bitter cold – try and stay warm. The month of February is our first step in preparation for next fall where our students will start pre-registration for the 2017-2018 school year.

What is pre-registration? The students choose their top eight classes and two options. At this time there is no set schedule. Once all pre-registrations are complete we'll plan the class schedule. Every student must sign their pre-registration form and their parent must also sign the form. This give the parents the opportunity to see their student's class selections and "sign off" on it. Mrs. Reuter, the school counselor, is the final signature on every student's pre-registration form. She reviews each student's class selection to verify they are taking appropriate classes which are required for each grade and are meeting their graduation requirements.

Students will receive their pre-registration forms on February 2, 2017. They will be due back to the office not later than Friday, February 24, 2017. This due date is necessary so that we can plan the class schedule. We try to create a schedule that accommodates the most students with the least amount of conflicts. Once we have the best class schedule created, Mrs. Reuter will personally meet with each students who has a class conflict. A student will only have a class schedule conflict if they are unable to get an eight period class schedule by using their eight selected classes or two options. Mrs. Reuter will then aid them in selecting an additional alternate class until we are able to fill their eight periods with an appropriate schedule.

After we have completed a successful class schedule, I will send out summer pre-registration letters to all students. Around the first week in August, each student will receive this letter which will contain their actual class schedule, complete with periods and teachers for every class. If the students and parents are satisfied with this schedule, nothing more needs to be done before the beginning of school next fall. If the students desire to make changes to their class schedule they will have two days (to be announced), to meet with the counselor to make changes prior to the start of school. Students will also have the first five days of the 2017-2018 school year to change their class schedule.

I am encouraging every parent to work with your student to help them plan their 2017-2018 class schedule – your input and encouragement is essential.

News from Rich Bacon, Middle School Principal & Athletic Director

Johnson County Central 8th graders were selected to take the National Assessment of Educational Progress on February 28th. The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) is the largest nationally representative and continuing assessment of what America's students know and can do in various subject areas. Assessments are conducted periodically in mathematics, reading, science, writing, the arts, civics, economics, geography, and U.S. history. Since NAEP assessments are administered uniformly using the same sets of test booklets across the nation, NAEP results serve as a common measuring stick for all states. The assessment stays essentially the same from year to year, with only carefully documented changes. This permits NAEP to provide a clear picture of student academic progress over time. NAEP provides results on subject-matter achievement, instructional experiences, and school environment for populations of students (e.g., all eighth-graders) and groups within those populations (e.g., female students, Hispanic students).

As we continue to talk to our students about post-secondary educational opportunities, Johnson County Central 8th graders visited the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and Nebraska Wesleyen University campuses on February 1st. We were given a tour of each campus and talked to campus leaders about things they should do in high school to better prepare them for success at a four-year college. This was an outstanding educational opportunity for our students as they start mapping out their course of study throughout high school.

Students who made the 2nd Quarter and 1st Semester Honor Roll were recognized at a school assembly. These students worked hard, turned in assignments, studied for tests, and met each of their individual teachers' classroom expectations. The following students received special recognition for earning straight A's for the 1st Quarter, 2nd Quarter, and 1st Semester: 8th Graders Calvin Antholz and Saylor Rother; 7th Graders: Madelyn Harrifeld and 6th Graders Erika Cabrales, Hayden Huskey & Aiden Weber. Congratulations to all students who were recognized at the assembly.

The Johnson County Central wrestling team and girls basketball team started practice in early January in preparation of their upcoming season. We have 22 girls playing basketball this winter and 6 boys participating in wrestling. Good luck to both teams and their coaches. Go Thunderbirds!

As a reminder, Johnson County Central utilizes an activity scheduler called rSchoolToday. Through rSchoolToday, a conference website has been created which provides links to school calendars and school websites of all the conference schools. Since this is a web-based calendar it will provide the user with instant access to the most up-to-date activity information at all times. Users can set themselves up for automatic email reminders or text messages to your cell phone or other mobile device and be instantly notified of any changes to any schedules. This is especially handy when games are postponed due to weather. You can access this website by going to <u>www.eastcentralnebraskaconf.org</u>. For help navigating the calendar you can click on "Parent Guide" and it will provide brief instructions on how to get started. You can also access the Johnson County Central calendar by simply clicking on the "Sports Calendar" on the school website. This is a great way to keep informed of any last minute changes to our sports schedule.

Very often, when I am reading about how to help people with attention, I am focusing on children. However, I recently began to look at how adults focus their attention.

I was speaking with an early childhood specialist (and that person will know who they are when they read this) and they told me how important it is for young children that parents, and adults, give their attention to the child when the child offers up conversation. The specialist shared with me how it can be detrimental to the child when the adult doesn't look at the child and answers with something general or monosyllabic such as, "un-huh" or " hmm". Well, that specialist might as well have slapped me in the face! I envisioned some of my own interactions (or lack of) with my own children; when they told me something that was important to them, but I lacked the cognizance to look up from my phone, reading or television to take advantage of this blessed moment. My child wanted to talk to me! And I blew it. Not only did I miss out on an opportunity to engage in a real back-and-forth conversation with my child, building their own sense of worth in knowing that their dad cared enough for them and their thoughts to put aside his frivolous media, but I also missed out on an opportunity to learn about my child, build their communication skills and expand their insatiable need of vocabulary and understanding about this world we live in. And, to give my spin on it all as "the Dad". I missed out. But, I have since learned from this awakening. I now watch, and listen, carefully for these moments to arrive. I make a point to put aside what it is I am doing, to face the youngster and to look them in the eye. I have to prepare myself to just listen, instead of preparing talk. Because, sometimes, that's all our children need, is for someone to listen. They just want to tell us stuff. And this, is how we truly get to know another person; by listening and watching.

Seniors: Now is the Time to Apply for Scholarships

Most scholarships are based on academics, but others are based on community service, school involvement, or talent in art, dance, music, or athletics. Some are based on financial need as determined by the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid).

It's time to start applying for scholarships. Here's where you can find them: **ScholarshipQuest at EducationQuest.org** features over 2,000 Nebraska-based scholarships. After you create a profile, you'll be matched with scholarships that fit your criteria.

• Your school counselor's office. Scholarship information is either e-mailed or given to all seniors at JCC. Local scholarship information will be available starting on Monday, January 23rd.

• **The college you plan to attend**. Contact the school for a list of scholarships they provide and application procedures.

National search sites such as College Board, Peterson's and Chegg.

Other resources could include your coach, clubs and organizations, and your parents' employers and civic organizations.

Lincoln Community Foundation Scholarships

The Lincoln Community Foundation administers more than 70 different scholarship funds--<u>many of</u> which are for students who live outside of Lincoln/Lancaster County.

All JCC seniors should be sure to visit the Lincoln Community Foundation website at <u>www.lcf.org</u> as there is one scholarship there that is only for JCC students, the Wayne J. and Wanda M. Lillich scholarship.

Students are able to apply for multiple scholarships by completing a single electronic application form. Their answers to questions within the application will match them to scholarships for which they <u>may be eligible</u> to apply. From this list they can select the specific scholarships for which they choose to apply and upload the required attachments for each one. <u>The application deadline is</u> <u>March 15th, 2017</u>.

Click on "Scholarships" in the "GRANTS" box near the top of our home page. Students can search scholarships by the specific name of the scholarship, or by keywords relating to the criteria of the scholarship. Watch the REQUIREMENTS in the scholarship description for a list of documents the student will be required to upload after they complete the application.

Students wishing to apply will need to create an account on our website prior to filling out the general application. After the application pages, they will be presented with a list of scholarships for which they may be eligible to apply.

Susan Thompson Buffett Scholarship

The Susan T. Buffett Foundation has offered scholarships to Nebraska students for more than fifty years. Scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis to first-time college freshmen who are residents of Nebraska and graduates of Nebraska high schools. High school seniors who qualify may apply for a Buffett scholarship at <u>http://buffettscholarships.org/college-scholarships</u>. Make sure you follow all steps and make sure that your application is officially submitted. Each year, many students across the state start the process for applying for this scholarship, unfortunately, many never complete it to final submission. The deadline to apply is February 1st, 2017 at 5:00 PM.

Education Quest Nebraska Scavenger Hunt Scholarship

Apply **by March 31** for EducationQuest's Scavenger Hunt Scholarship. You might win \$500 toward your college education. Here's how it works:

Students review math facts and the math skills that they are working on in their classrooms. The students are able to use the Accelerated Math program to help practice and reinforce the skills that have been taught.
