SUPERINTENDENT NOTES by Jack D. Moles

I would like to take this opportunity to discuss a few unrelated items for the sake of providing information that normally is not passed on to our patrons. I would just like to provide the opportunity to get a brief glimpse into "how things work".

SCHOOL CALENDAR

I have a committee of teachers help me develop the calendar each year. This committee is made up of one representative each from the high school, middle school, and from both of our elementary sites. Some points we look at in our discussion:

- 1. I provide the committee with some "absolutes"—things that need to be on the calendar or things that need to be avoided. The teachers have a 186-day contract year, so we must include 186 work days. We also try to include some "in-service" days where teachers have an opportunity to work together on curricular issues throughout the year. We also try to get the number of days per semester to be as even as possible, but this is not exact. We normally have more days in second semester.
- 2. One issue that the Board of Education and I have decided we should try to do is to honor both the Otoe and Johnson County Fairs. We believe it is important for our students and staff to have the opportunity to take part in the fairs. We have tweaked this in different ways in the past, with the coming year offering us another way to deal with this. Since the Friday of the Johnson County Fair is the most important to some, we will not have a teacher workday that day. We will push the start of school back another day as a result. As a result of honoring the two county fairs our calendar often does not resemble the calendars of neighboring districts.
- 3. I always ask the committee what they want Christmas break to look like. Amazingly, this does define what our calendar looks like as much, or more, than anything else we consider.
- 4. People often ask me how many "snow days" we have built into the schedule. Actually, the state requires us to provide a certain number of hours of instruction (1080 for grades 7-12, 1054 for elementary). There is no set number of days a school must be in session. Of course, if we missed extended days we do consider having school on some of our days off later in the year. For example, we could choose to have classes on an in-service day or one of the days of spring break. I do not like the concept of simply tacking on days at the end of the year, as I think better learning opportunities are provided earlier in the semester.

After the committee has helped me develop a rough draft, I then share it with the Principals for their input. After considering input from the Principals, I then take a recommended calendar to the Board of Education for adoption.



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STAFFING

Changes in the teaching staff are based on the needs of our students. The Board of Education has been very supportive of providing the teaching staff that is needed. Over the past seven years we have made the many different moves, all based on what is best for kids. Some of the types of moves we have made include:

- 1. We have had some staff leave who we did not replace. We simply chose to "absorb" the loss of a teaching position and spread out the duties that teacher had. When this happens, we obviously see a cost reduction.
- 2. We have added in a position. The most recent example of this was the hiring of an "alternative education" teacher this year. This move was made to provide for students for whom the traditional classroom setting might not be the most optimal setting for them. Obviously, adding in a new position results in a cost increase.
- 3. We have shifted the duties of teachers. An example of this occurred when we made the decision a few years ago to add in a Reading Teacher in the elementary who would help all students in reading instruction. We downsized from three to two sections of some elementary grades, resulting in the ability to create the Reading Teacher position.
- 4. We have added in a position to offset costs that were going to another source. The Board of Ed recently approved the contract for a Speech Pathologist for next school year. In the past we have contracted through ESU 4 in Auburn. ESU 4 had worked to provide for the needs of our students but was having a hard time finding the trained personnel we needed. I recommended to the Board that we try to hire our own Speech Pathologist, as we have a definite need. Luckily, we were able to hire our own teacher. This will result in meeting the needs of our students, while also providing a cost reduction for these services.

In considering non-certificated staff members, we have looked at ways to keep costs down, while at the same time remaining true to the concept of providing for our students as best as possible. The most direct way in which we provide for our students academically is through the use of paraprofessionals, or teachers' aides. These individuals do a wonderful job of helping all of our students. We have seen an increase in the number of aides we use over the past several years, but this is in direct correlation to our growing student needs in areas such as Special Education and ELL (English Language Learners). We are also trying to respond to needs based on poverty and student mobility. Each year the administrators, along with input from teachers, identify our biggest needs, then determine how our aides can best be utilized. At times the administrators go to the Board with recommendations that call for an increase in the number of aides. Again, we try to minimize adding, but at times this cannot be avoided.



SAFETY AND SECURITY

An issue patrons may have noticed is being considered by the Board of Education is improving safety and security measures at the school. We see need for upgrades. The current ideas we are considering include:

- 1. Secured main accesses. A project we are considering is installing "buzz in" systems in the main entrances of each of the three main buildings. We also may install "card" or "fob" access systems on other entrances so staff members can have easier access.
- 2. Security cameras. I have recommended placing cameras at our main entrances, in hallways with lockers, restrooms, and locker rooms, some main outdoor areas, and in areas with more potential for injury (gyms, weight rooms, etc.).
- 3. Improved classroom locks. Although all classroom doors can be locked, some do not provide the safest way to lock the door if there was an incident in the building.
- 4. Improved camera systems on buses. Although we have cameras on our buses, improving the system is still under consideration.

As stated earlier, these are some issues that the general public likely knows we discuss, but do not really have a background into how or why we made decisions. I hope this provides a little insight.

NEWS FROM PRINCIPAL RICK LESTER

At JCC we've completed three quarters of our school year and now we're heading into one of the busiest times of the year. Spring practices have begun and these activities keep our students super busy.

At this time we are finishing up our MAPS testing. These tests gage our student's strengths and weaknesses in Reading, Math, Science and Language. Our teachers can address content strengths and weaknesses and structure their curriculum to gear towards improving our students' weaknesses. We use MAPS testing in the fall and spring, and our goal is to see improved scores for the students between these testing times.

If we have students who don't reach the proficiency score on their Science, Math or Reading MAPS test, we strongly encourage them to take Applied Chemistry, Applied Geometry or Applied Literacy Concepts (Reading Class). These three classes are especially geared towards aiding these students to obtain a better knowledge of the content and build a stronger foundation in these curriculum areas so they can become more proficient in the classroom and achieve better test scores in the future.

All students in grades 8^{th} – 11^{th} have pre-registered for the 2014-2015 school year. After tallying the students' class requests, I will then line up the teachers' preps. Mrs. Moles will then work with power school in placing the classes in a workable schedule to accommodate all high school students. We hope to have this done in the next month.

Prom is one of the most elaborate activities occurring this spring and it is set for Saturday, March 29, 2014 in the high school gym. The junior class has been working hard on the design and preparation of this event. The format will generally remain the same with our Johnson County Sheriff department administering breathalyzer tests before prom and before post prom. Post prom will be a fun after party in Omaha sponsored by junior and senior parents.

Parent-Teacher Conferences were held on March 18th & 19th marking the end of the third quarter. We had a decent turnout this spring with over 50% of our Middle School students represented. For those parents who were unable to attend Parent-Teacher Conferences, report cards have been sent home with your child. I encourage those parents to make contact with their child's teachers to get clarification on how their student is doing in all areas of their education, not just grades. This important interaction between teacher and parent can benefit the student immensely when utilized.

Students will be taking a number of Nebraska State Accountability (NeSA) tests through the month of April. These assessments are very important for our students and the district. Results from these assessments provide data which help guide curriculum decisions for our district. Results from these assessments will also be used to help determine a student's academic placement for the next school year. As the testing dates approach, there are some test-taking strategies and some things parents can do to help their children be successful on these assessments:

- Make sure your child gets a good night's sleep and eats a good breakfast the morning of the tests.
- Have your child dress in layers studies show children do better on assessments if they don't have to think about how hot or cold they are.
- Encourage your child to practice the following test-taking strategies: Skip a question and move on if you don't know the answer you can always come back to that question later; Check your answers carefully; Make sure the numbers of your answers correspond to the numbers of the questions on the test; Encourage your child to read on the days leading up to the test. The easiest and best way to prepare your child to do well on tests is to have them read often.
- Encourage your child to take the tests seriously. A lot of important decisions regarding your children are made based on data we receive from these tests. If students don't give their best effort on the standardized tests, much of our data will be invalid, making it difficult to make decisions that will be in the bests interests of our students.
- Keep a good attitude. Think positively!

Girls and boys track and the boys golf seasons have begun. The track teams have already gotten off to a strong start this spring with the boys winning the Nebraska Wesleyan Indoor meet. Spring College Fairs in Omaha and Lincoln:

Omaha Area College Fair, Sunday, April 6, 1-3 p.m., University of Nebraska at Omaha and Lincoln Area College Fair, Sunday April 13, 1-3 p.m., Southeast Community College-Lincoln.

The fairs will feature representatives from colleges across the state, region, and nation. This is a great opportunity for students-especially juniors and sophomores-to begin their college selection process.

Before attending, students should register for a barcode at NebraskaCollegeFairs.org, print the barcode and take it to the fair so that college representatives can scan their demographic information.

Summer Opportunities for High School Students:

Unicameral Youth Legislature: is June 8-11, 2014, and is open to all high school students. The Unicameral Youth Legislature is the ultimate opportunity to learn what it is like to serve as a state senator. Students will discover the unique process of our nation's only unicameral by sponsoring bills, conducting committee hearings and debating legislation at the Nebraska State Capitol. Students will conduct their legislative duties in the historic Warner Chamber, the former home of the Nebraska Senate, which was closed to the public in 1937. Registration includes lodging, meals (including lunch at the Governor's Mansion), and transportation from UNL's East Campus to the State Capitol. The deadline to register is May 15. Early-bird registration is \$325. \$100 scholarships are available. UNMC Summer Health Professions Career Workshop: will be held at the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) on Tuesday, July 29 – Friday, August 1, 2014. This workshop is designed to give students the opportunity to investigate different health careers through a hands-on learning program. Students entering their junior year, who have a minimum GPA or 3.0 and who have an interest in the health professions are invited to apply. (Maximum enrollment is 14 students.) Cost for the program is \$275 which includes: breakfast, lunch and snacks while on the UNMC Campus during the day, program costs and fees, transportation while in Omaha and chaperone and dorm room expenses. Students will be housed in dormitory rooms at the Scott's Residence Hall at UNO. Completed applications are due back to UNMC by June 2, 2014. Health Career Camp 2014: Experience a hands-on introduction to health care careers at Bryan College of Health Sciences in Lincoln, July 7-11 or July 21-25, 2014. To participate, students must be a high school student age 16 or older, be interested in a health career and enjoy science classes. Camp activities include seeing "Human Body Specimens," a sleep lab, and your kidney, spleen or beating heart, experiencing ultrasounds and Skills Lab demonstrations such as starting an IV, providing basic wound care, inserting an NG tube, and starting a Foley Catheter, as well as, shadowing a health care professional. Qualified applicants will be accepted on a first come, first served basis. Stanford Pre-College Summer Institute and Summer College for High School Students: Programs offer highly motivated and intellectually curious students the opportunity to explore and discover topics not typically taught in secondary schools. In the Summer Institute, students who are ages 14-17, will engage in 3-4 week intensive study single-subject courses. Courses in areas that range from biotechnology to entrepreneurship and creative writing are customized to give students deep exposure and hands-on experience. Participating students will perform team building and leadership exercises, create and receive feedback on resumes and interview skills for college and jobs, perform a "strengths" assessment and learn to use their strengths, receive detailed information on how to be successful in college courses (emphasis on science courses), actively participate in study skills exercises, and meet several healthcare professionals and students. Camp will begin at 9:30 a.m and conclude no later than 4 p.m. each day. Lunch will be provided and is included in the \$50 camp fee. Knowledgeable speakers will strive to motivate and educate the delegates by addressing current agricultural issues and pointing out the many opportunities this industry has to offer. One of the more popular events is the computer-simulated farm management program which challenges the delegates to work together as teams to manage their own farms. TITLE 1 - SALLY HUTT - K-3 - April 2014

A Parent Survey was conducted last month. Some of the survey results will follow.

One survey was sent home with the oldest student in all grades K-5. **One-hundred and one** surveys were distributed. **Eighty-five** surveys were answered and returned.

On questions 1-10, the survey asked whether the reader understood the Title 1 program, its purpose, whether or not the respondents experienced satisfaction with communication by Title 1 teachers, and how respondents rated their familiarity with the Parent Involvement Policy in the Handbook. Of those surveys returned, an average of 94% of those responses were YES. Concerning questions 11-13, the survey asked if help was needed from Title 1 with homework, whether more information or materials were needed and whether the reader would attend an annual meeting about Title 1. Of those surveys returned, an average of only 33% answered YES to the final three questions. The personal comments were very helpful and appreciated. We hope to improve our program using these results. Thank you for your time and thoughts.



Boys Track by Dustin Buggi




