Dear Parents, Guardians, and Patrons of Johnson County Central School District,

Johnson County Central Schools, similar to many other schools in the area, would like to inform our parents, guardians, and patrons about the dangers/risks of Vaping/JUULing. The purpose of the article is to inform you of the issue, give you resources if you feel your student is involved in this kind of behavior, as well as alert you to repercussions if your child engages in vaping on school property. We take this issue very seriously due to the negative health effects vaping can have on our students and we wanted to make parents and guardians aware of the risks around vaping and what these devices might look like.

Vaping, also known as JUULing, has become popular with youth in middle school and high school. Vaping means using an electronic cigarette or other vaping device. It is referred to as vaping because tiny puffs or clouds of vapor are produced when using the devices. E-cigarettes are battery powered and deliver nicotine through a liquid, called e-juice. The liquid turns into a vapor when it is used in these devices. The liquid comes in many different flavors and that is appealing to young people. Youth often believe that the liquid used in vaping only contains water vapor and flavoring, but this is not the truth. It contains nicotine, volatile organic compounds, ultrafine particles, heavy metals (nickel, tin, and lead), flavorings such as Diacetyl which is a chemical linked to serious lung disease, and cancer-causing chemicals. Nicotine is highly addictive, especially to the developing teen brain. What begins as experimentation can easily lead to a lifetime of nicotine addiction. It does not take that long for young people to become addicted to nicotine because:

- 1. E-Cigarettes provide nicotine in doses as large as, or larger than, regular cigarettes do.
- 2. Children and youth become addicted to nicotine much faster than adults.
- 3. Nicotine has more harmful effects on the developing adolescent brain, making it worse for kids than adults.
- 4. Nicotine is thought to be a social and biological "gateway" for the use of other substances, like initiating combustible cigarette use, alcohol, and other drugs.

Many types of E-cigarettes are available, but one popular brand is JUUL. JUUL is becoming more prevalent with youth in middle school and high school because of its small size. It looks like a USB device. When using the JUUL, it is often referred to as JUULing.



It is important to talk with your kids about the dangers of vaping. It is important to learn about the different shapes and types of E-Cigarettes and the risks of all forms of E-Cigarette/Tobacco use for young people. It is important to talk to your children about the risks to young people that occur with all types of tobacco usage. Here are two resources that you can use to talk to your kids about vaping. It is the Surgeon General's 2016 report on E-Cigarette use, and their tip sheet for parents. If you feel your child has already developed an addiction to nicotine, we suggest you reach out to your healthcare provider.

Did you know that underage use of E-cigarettes of all kinds is illegal? All states prohibit the sale, purchase, or use of E-cigarettes or liquid nicotine containers by all minors (under the age of 18). At JCC, we prohibit that use of any tobacco product on our school grounds. Our students are subject to disciplinary actions if they are found to possess or are using tobacco products on JCC School grounds.

We hope you find this article informative and understand our concerns about this potentially harmful issues. Our goal is to partner with parents to help support our students in making positive decisions for themselves and the high school community.

Loving The Process

Almost every Thursday for the past two years, after the football team's walk-through practice, Josh Bailey shares a quote of inspiration for his teammates. This is a moment that all of us have come to look forward to.

The week of our home game against Malcolm, Josh shared a quote by Inky Johnson that I am all too familiar with: "Fall in

love with the process." (If you're not familiar with Inky, I highly recommend listening to some of his wisdom.) Some of our athletes seemed confused by this quote and even wondered aloud what Josh and Inky were talking about.

"The process" is how we get to our goals, and if we don't love the process, we'll never reach our goals. Everyone loves rewards and recognition, but not everyone loves what it takes to get those rewards; the process.

The process can be a number of things. It can be the sacrifice of time, the physical strain and pushing the limits of the cardiovascular system that goes into athletic training. It can be the note taking, the question asking and the hours spent studying for a test. It can be the emotional strain (and drain) of sticking to your words and consequences when parenting. The point is that "the process" is usually the hard part. Just buying books for your children isn't enough. You have to invest the time into reading with them. Just showing up to practice isn't enough. You have to work hard and learn. Just showing up to school isn't enough.

You have to invest your attentions, put forth best efforts and be ready to fail forward. (Failing forward is knowing that our failures lead to improvements, which lead to success.)

And in many instances, putting that time and effort into practice time and school time alone won't get us to the levels we want. It will be the process of investing personal time into studying, working and training that will truly make one exceptional.

So, now's the tough question. How do we get our children to "love the process"? It starts with us having clear expectations, communicating clearly with our children, investing our own time, teaching our children there will be failures and that they need to be teachable and coachable. And, they will need our constant support. Start young with play, fun and educationally enriching activities.

Seniors: Apply for a Susan Buffett Foundation Scholarship Starting on November 1st

Apply for a Susan Buffett Foundation Scholarship if you are eligible. The online application for this program is open from November 1st to February 1st. As part of the application, students must attach a seven-semester high school transcript. Seniors can request their seven-semester transcript from me starting on January 7th. They can complete all other parts of the application before then. For more information and to apply, visit https://buffettscholarships.org/
To be eligible for a scholarship from The Susan T. Buffett Foundation, a student must:

- Be a resident of Nebraska
 - Residency is determined by the institution where you enroll
- Graduate from a Nebraska high school or earn a Nebraska GED
- Achieve at least a 2.5 cumulative unweighted GPA in high school
 - 2.5 on a 4 point scale
 - 83 on a 100 point scale
- Be a first-time freshman when entering college
- Students obtaining dual enrollment credits in high school are still eligible to apply
 - ♦ Nebraska Community Colleges CCC, MCC, MPCC, NECC, SCC, or WNCC;
 - Nebraska State College System Chadron State, Peru State, Wayne State; or
 - ♦ University of Nebraska NCTA, UNK, UNL, UNMC, or UNO
- Be in need of financial assistance in order to attend school
 - Note: Students do not need to be Pell Grant eligible to qualify
 - Students must have an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) below \$10,000

Seniors: Complete the FAFSA as Soon as Possible

- First, create an FSA ID for you and one for a parent at fsaid.ed.gov. You'll need it to access and sign the FAFSA. Click here for instructions.
- Complete the FAFSA at fafsa.gov. You may also complete it via the new myStudentAid app for iOS and Android.

RHOP, KHOP, and RLOP at Wayne State, Chadron State, and Peru State Colleges and the University of Nebraska- Kearney

Students from high schools in rural areas who are interested in a future career in a medical field should look into applying for the RHOP program at Peru State, Wayne State, or Chadron State or the KHOP program at the University of Nebraska- Kearney. This program guarantees students who meet all requirements of the program that they will have a seat save for them at UNMC after they complete their undergraduate work. Students interested in a future career in law should look into applying for the RLOP (Rural Law Opportunities Program) at Wayne State, UNK, or Chadron State. Completion of this program and all requirements guarantee students a spot in the UNL Law School after they complete their undergraduate work. Haley Beethe


