## SUPERINTENDENT REPORT APRIL 2019 by Dr. Galen Boldt

When are we going to stop talking about the weather?? The horrific flooding that consumes our state, especially our neighbors to the north, is just another chapter in the tale of 2018-19 that represents one of those extra-ordinary years where you just have to hang-on-to-your-hat!! As an administrative team, we made the decision to cancel our Parent Teachers Conferences for the Spring session so that we could use the time for
 making up for lost contact time with students due to the 4 days that we had to cancel. This is really one of those decisions that we did not want to make, because communication with our parents as partners in the education of our kids is a critical component. The last thing that we want you to think is that we don't feel like conferencing with parents is important, but as we look at the number of ways that we already are able to have conversations with our parents through phone calls, emails, text-messaging, etc., we felt that taking advantage of every opportunity for teaching students made the most sense in light of the days we have missed. Again, the partnerships we create with parents represents the foundation of supporting our students in the pursuit of their hopes and dreams, and communication becomes the cement that holds that foundation together. We want to invite parents and guardians to contact our teachers and principals in all matters relating to their kids, especially in these circumstances where we are making changes in our schedule due to weather decisions.

We continue to engage in powerful discussions as we make progress in the discussion about the future of Johnson County Central Public Schools. At our March Board Meeting we had a full house with lots of folks present to speak their voice on the matters that pertain to the future of our school. I know there is a lot of speculation about what we are really going to do, I want to emphasize to everyone that up until this point we have only been engaged in a needs assessment as we look at our current programs and facilities. The goal of the March Board meeting was to give the Board reports from the Facilities and Programming Committees. We have some really good people putting lots of time into making a fair and accurate assessment of the current conditions of facilities and the future programs that we want to provide for our students. After great discussion, we decided to get cost estimates that give us a pretty good idea about what the real costs are associated with several scenarios including:

- Keep everything going exactly as we currently are operating.
- Move all PreK-12 education to the Tecumseh site and develop the Cook site into a Career Academy for Trades.
- Move all PreK-12 education to the Tecumseh site including all Career Academy concepts.

With this in mind, we want to share the information that we gain with the public in a community forum format similar to our past meetings. This time, however, we will not be talking about whether or not we need to do something, but looking at the costs associated with different options. Again, it is important to understand that the future of our school and all of our discussions need to be organized around our kids and how we can be good stewards of taxpayer money and still do what is best for our kids.

Our meetings are set for Monday April 15, 7:00 p.m. at the Tecumseh HS Gym, and Tuesday April 16, 7:00 p.m at the Cook MS Gym. Please put those dates on your calendar and come prepared to learn more about the costs associated with any plans that the Board might be considering. I cannot emphasize enough the importance of understanding that no decisions have been made regarding specific steps to be taken, but we do want to know what the community is thinking about how to best support our kids.

Is happiness found? Can it be found? Or, is it a mindset? Is it in how we think of ourselves and others? Is it what we $d o$, or don't do, that brings happiness?

How we model happiness and the ways to be find happiness, is what our children will do. How we respond to our day. How we respond to other people. How we respond to adversity. Our children are watching and learning.

There is research on happiness and positive thinking. There are ways we can practice and teach others.

In an article from The Today Show titled "How to be happy: 4 tips from positive psychology researchers", Michelle Gielan and Shawn Achor give four(4) tips.
1.Direct your focus to smile more often.
2.Practice gratitude - not just to others, but to yourself for the little things in life.
3.Spread positivity-give genuine compliments to others.
4.Challenge yourself-do something good for someone else.

So, what's the science behind some of this? Positive emotions happen more frequently, but last for a shorter duration than negative emotions. In contrast, negative emotions happen less often, but last longer per event. We tend to dwell on them. However, keeping a positive mindset allows up to connect with others, have a more open mind, take in more of our surroundings, build resilience and are physically more healthy. When we are more positive, we are more approachable. One way to do this is to focus on others, and to be kind and compassionate to others. This will bring a more lasting feeling of happiness, connectedness and belonging.

So, what to do when are children are experiencing negative emotions. In an article from the website EmpoweringParents.com, Debbie Pincus, MS LMHC offers seven suggestions.
1.Don't try to turn your child into something they're not-you can't make their choices for them and you can't react for them, but you can choose how you respond to them.
2.Try to be nonjudgmentalin a sense be nonreactive. Just listen.
3.Don't personalize it-when your child is negative don't take it personally.
4.Be direct-if you're busy or stressed yourself, let them know that it is not a good time for the conversation but you'll make time for it later. Just make sure you do.
5.Reflect but don't reactyou can listen without agreeing with their negativity or without criticizing them. Again, not very many words from the adult. Just let them know you hear them.
6.Put a time limit on com-plaints-appoint a certain time each day when you will allow them to complain, but it can only be during that time. Or, give them a place to write their complaints down.
7.Give honest feedback-let your child know how negative talk impacts those around them versus positive talk.

How we respond will determine how they continue to react to the world around them. How we model positivity and happiness goes a long way. Keep up the good fight parents! We're all in it together!

Encourage your child to take the tests seriously. A lot of important decisions regarding your children are made based on data we receive from these tests. If students don't give their best effort on the standardized tests much of our data will be invalid, making it difficult to make decisions that will be in the best interests of our students.
Keep a good attitude. Think positively!
Congratulations also goes out to our Junior High Choir, Junior High Band, and $6^{\text {th }}$ Grade Band for their outstanding performances at the HTRS Music Contest. The Choir and both bands earned a " 1 " for their performances. We also had several soloists and small groups who earned high marks. Good job to JCC's music students and Mr. Doran and Mrs. Fricke.

## Freshmore Clinic

Monday, February 25, JCC hosted the $26^{\text {th }}$ annual Freshmore Clinic. This is a clinic Mr. Doran started in 1994 to help strengthen the younger voices (Freshmen and Sophomores) from area schools. We rehearsed 175 students from 11 schools all day in the Elementary Auditorium and presented a 6:30 PM concert that evening. The clinicians were Kevin Boesiger \& June Bowers who took turns directing and accompanying.

Here are some interesting facts about Freshmore:
There have been 50 schools participating (some of which are no longer around): Adams; AshlandGreenwood; Auburn; Beatrice; Columbus, Conestoga; Crete; Cross County; Dawson/Verdon; DillerOdell, Doniphan-Trumbull; Fairbury, Falls City; Falls City Sacred Heart; Freeman; Gretna; JohnsonBrock; Johnson County Central; Lewiston; Lincoln Christian; Lincoln Lutheran; Lincoln Northeast; Lincoln Southeast; Louisville; Lourdes Central Catholic; Malcolm; Mead; Meridian; Nebraska City; Nemaha Valley; Palmyra; Parkview Christian; Pawnee City; Plattsmouth; Southeast Consolidated; Syracuse; Table Rock-Steinhauer; Tecumseh; Tri-Coutny, Wahoo; Waterloo; Waverly; Weeping Water, \& Yutan.

There have been a total of 65 different directors who have brought students from those 50 schools.
A total of 3,769 singers have performed (not including guest show choirs) which averages to 150 a year. The high participation was 260 students and the low was 75 students. We have had only one cancellation due to weather.
Four have been held on March 4 \& March 8, three on March 7, and two on March 5 (my birthday). While the others have been spread around the month of March with 4 in February \& 1 in April.
80 different songs have been performed.
2 of those songs have been written for us.
