

NEWS FROM PRINCIPAL RICK LESTER

Johnson County Central Schools, similar to many other schools in the area, would like to inform our parents, guardians, and patrons about the dangers/risks of Vaping/JUULing. The purpose of the article is to inform you of the issue, give you resources if you feel your student is involved in this kind of behavior, as well as alert you to repercussions if your child engages in vaping on school property. We take this issue very seriously due to the negative health effects vaping can have on our students and we wanted to make parents and guardians aware of the risks around vaping and what these devices might look like.

Vaping, also known as JUULing, has become popular with youth in middle school and high school. Vaping means using an electronic cigarette or other vaping device. It is referred to as vaping because tiny puffs or clouds of vapor are produced when using the devices. E-cigarettes are battery powered and deliver nicotine through a liquid, called e-juice. The liquid turns into a vapor when it is used in these devices. The liquid comes in many different flavors and that is appealing to young people. Youth often believe that the liquid used in vaping only contains water vapor and flavoring, but this is not the truth. It contains nicotine, volatile organic compounds, ultrafine particles, heavy metals (nickel, tin, and lead), flavorings such as Diacetyl which is a chemical linked to serious lung disease, and cancer-causing chemicals. Nicotine is highly addictive, especially to the developing teen brain. What begins as experimentation can easily lead to a lifetime of nicotine addiction. It does not take that long for young people to become addicted to nicotine because:

- 1. E-Cigarettes provide nicotine in doses as large as, or larger than, regular cigarettes do.
- 2. Children and youth become addicted to nicotine much faster than adults.
- 3. Nicotine has more harmful effects on the developing adolescent brain, making it worse for kids than adults.
- 4. Nicotine is thought to be a social and biological "gateway" for the use of other substances, like initiating combustible cigarette use, alcohol, and other drugs.
- 5. The CDC is researching the cases of severe lung disease that are possibly caused by vaping. The research is trying to pinpoint what is the main cause of these cases, whether it be a certain product or chemical that is the cause. These cases have caused severe damage to lungs and also have caused several deaths.
- 6. Black Market Vaping Products do not have federal regulations that they have to follow for their products. With this being said, there is nothing that prohibits them from putting dangerous and illegal substances into their products.

Many types of E-cigarettes are available, but one popular brand is JUUL. JUUL is becoming more prevalent with youth in middle school and high school because of its small size. It looks like a USB device. When using the JUUL, it is often referred to as JUULing.

These are just several of the different types of E-cigarettes. The first one shown is the JUUL. As you can see, it looks just like a USB device.



It is important to talk with your kids about the dangers of vaping. It is important to learn about the different shapes and types of E-Cigarettes and the risks of all forms of E-Cigarette/Tobacco use for young people. It is important to talk to your children about the risks to young people that occur with all types of tobacco usage.

Here are two resources that you can use to talk to your kids about vaping. It is the Surgeon General's 2016 report on E-Cigarette use, and their tip sheet for parents. If you feel your child has already developed an addiction to nicotine, we suggest you reach out to your healthcare provider.

Did you know that underage use of E-cigarettes of all kinds is illegal? All states prohibit the sale, purchase, or use of E-cigarettes or liquid nicotine containers by all minors (under the age of 18). At JCC, we prohibit the use of any tobacco products (ie cigarettes, chewing tobacco, or vaping) on our school grounds. Our Students at JCC are subject to random drug testing and nicotine is one of the items we do test for. Our students are subject to disciplinary actions if they are tested positive for nicotine during the drug testing or they are found to possess or are using tobacco products on JCC School grounds. We ask all patrons and visitors to JCC to respect and abide by these rules.

We hope you find this article informative and understand our concerns about this potentially harmful issues. Our goal is to partner with parents to help support our students in making positive decisions for themselves and the high school community.

There is a lot of media coverage regarding vaping, especially recently with the possibility it can cause severe lung disease in people that vape. This is an ongoing medical investigation by the CDC to try to pinpoint the certain chemical or product that is causing these severe cases of lung damage and several deaths. Again, this is an ongoing investigation.

Thank you for your continued support of our school system.

MIDDLE SCHOOL & ATHLETIC NEWS

The first quarter ends on Thursday, October 17^{th} , and Parent-Teacher Conferences will be held on Tuesday, October 22 from 12:00-8:00 p.m. There are still a few weeks left in the quarter for students to work on their grades. Hopefully parents won't wait until conferences to find out how their child has done. I encourage all parents talk to their children about their study habits and academic progress, check out their sons/daughters grades on Power School before the end of the quarter, and encourage your child to finish the quarter strong.

During the first 2 weeks of school all students were administered the Measures of Academic Progress or MAP test. These are computerized adaptive tests that provide teachers information that can be used to improve teaching and learning. Results from these tests provide achievement and growth data for each grade level and individual student that will allow our teachers to develop targeted instructional strategies to improve student learning. Students took tests in the subject areas of Reading, Language Usage, Math, and Science. Teachers can use MAP growth data to pinpoint the instructional areas our students are ready to tackle-whether they are on, above or below grade level and can use this data to differentiate instruction and pinpoint individual student needs. Information from these assessments can be used to identify areas of strengths and weaknesses for each individual student and also provide our staff with information on where our curriculum may need some improvement.

Middle school athletics is in full swing as we are in the last half of the fall sports season. We have 18 boys playing football, 18 girls playing volleyball and 4 boys and 1 girl running cross country during the fall season. These student-athletes are working hard to improve their fundamentals and come together as a team, and are committing a great deal of time and effort to participate. There are still a few opportunities to watch our teams play at home. Come out and support the Thunderbirds! Keep up the good work, Coaches and Athletes!

Congratulations to the Thunderbird volleyball team and Coach Hedger and Coach Franklin for winning the B-Division Championship at the MUDECAS Volleyball Tournament! GO THUNDERBIRDS!

The 7th & 8th grade Band marched at the Richardson County Fair in Humboldt and have been performing in the Pep Band at our home football and volleyball games. The Nebraska Reading Improvement Act – Nebraska's Approach to Literacy

In 2018, Nebraska's Reading Improvement Act was enacted. The Nebraska Reading Improvement Act, which goes into effect for the 2019-2020 school year, takes a comprehensive approach to improve the reading skills of students in kindergarten through third grade. It is designed to provide reading instruction based on what works to position all students for success as they progress through their education journey and into college and career readiness. The heart of the program is early identification of students who need extra reading help so that they receive targeted intervention. The following are key components of the Nebraska Reading Improvement Act:

- NDE: NDE will provide a list of approved reading assessments and the threshold level of performance for each assessment.
- •<u>School Boards</u>: School Boards may develop policies for reading instruction and intervention services to address all students' reading needs.
- •<u>Teachers</u>: K-3 teachers must be effective based on classroom observations and student improvement in reading, or receive specialized training in early literacy.
- •Assessment: All K-3 students are assessed three times per year with an approved reading assessment to measure progress and to support teachers with targeted instruction to meet individual student needs.
- <u>Early Identification</u>: Within the first 30 days of school, schools and districts use the approved reading assessment to assess students in kindergarten through third grade to identify those who may be have a reading difficulty.
- •<u>Parent Engagement</u>: All parents or guardians of K-3 grade students are kept informed of their child's reading progress and parents or guardians of students who are identified with a reading difficulty are notified in writing no later than 15 days after the identification.
- •<u>Supplemental Reading Intervention Programs</u>: Any student identified with a reading difficulty must be provided a supplemental intervention program. The supplemental reading intervention program should be implemented during regular school hours in addition to regularly scheduled reading instruction unless otherwise agreed to by a parent or quardian.
- •<u>Individual Reading Improvement Plans</u>: Any student identified with a reading difficulty will receive an individual reading improvement plan no later than 30 days after identification. The plan is created in collaboration with the parent or guardian and describes the reading intervention services and support the student will receive through the supplemental reading intervention program.
- •Summer Reading Program: Summer reading programs are to be made available by schools for any student in grade 1-3 who has been identified as continuing to have a reading difficulty. Such programs may be community-based (not affiliated with the school) or offered online.

So, What Does This Mean for JCC?

- All JCC students grades K-3 will be given the MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) Reading Assessment in the fall, winter and spring.
 - MAP Growth: Reading K-2 for grades K-1
 - MAP Growth: Reading 2-5 for grades 2-3.
- Parents of students not meeting minimum thresholds for Reading on the MAP Assessment set by the State of Nebraska will be notified.
 - A meeting will be scheduled with the parents to create a plan for reading improvement.



School Improvement Notes

School Improvement is an ongoing process that examines our practices, programs, and curriculum. From those observations we make plans to improve teaching practices to increase student learning and achievement. Standards alignment, assessment practices, professional development opportunities, curriculum reviews, use of researched-based instructional practices, community support, and addressing and celebrating diversity are all critical for the school improvement process.

In the spring of 2021 will will have an external review. A group of professionals from around the state will spend a few days in our hallways and classrooms making observations, and will meet with groups of school personnel, students, and parents. We have several committees gathering the information needed for this external review.

Mission Committee is developing a new mission statement for our district.

Profile Committee is collecting information about our school district. This is a snapshot of Johnson County Central Schools. It will include demographic data, program data, and resources.

Professional Development Committee - is documenting workshops, conferences, coursework, inservices, and resources that focus on teaching practices, student learning, research, and the school improvement goal.

Student Performance Committee is analyzing data from ACT, NSCAS, and MAP assessments. The committee will look at individual data as well as cohort data.


Perceptual Data Committee will be collecting data from student surveys, staff surveys, stakeholder surveys, and graduate surveys. This information is valuable for understanding the thoughts of our students, their parents, and our staff, which can affect future decisions.

Book Fair Under the Sea


Reading for pleasure inside and outside of school has real and long-lasting benefits. It unlocks the power of information and imagination and helps children discover who they are.
