

# Superintendent Report November 2019 

At the October School Board Meeting we had a great discussion about the future of our school that resulted in an exciting decision to
 interview architect candidates. This decision would engage us in discussion about the details of what a building/renovation project looks like. This is the first of many steps that could be happening this school year that would allow our community to voice their wishes about the future of our school and facilities. There are a ton of details that need to be determined, but this first step is the beginning of a journey that could have a huge impact on the future. The discussion at the October Board Meeting centered on how we might get all PreK-12 education on one site and the elimination of the current Tecumseh Elementary Building, which has served our school district well but is at the end of its productive usefulness. Many thoughts will be considered about what, when, and where for future building, but the decision to move forward with selection of an architect will help with defining what alternatives could be available for a price that would be determined by the Board of Education. Details will unfold in future months.

When I drove up to school today, the sight that I saw reminded me of my first tenure at Tecumseh in the 80 's when there was no mobile classroom between the two buildings at the Tecumseh site. Thanks to Gary Kuhl and his crew for their work in removing the unit from school property. We contracted with him to get the job done, and we are now appreciating the open space that is left. We have some concrete repairs to do where the slabs are broken and have created a safety issue, but already the open space is being greeted with excitement. The mobile unit served the district well over the years, but now we can eliminate the utilities required to operate it and clean up the appearance of our school as you pull up. Thanks to all of the teachers who had to move and make a new room home for their classes this year. Again, our maintenance crew and the entire staff are doing a great job of enhancing the appearance of all of our facilities and I am thankful for all of the efforts put into making the school something to be proud of.

We will welcome Senator Slama to our school on Tuesday, November $5^{\text {th }}$ for an opportunity meet and greet the Senator. I've had the pleasure of getting to know her during her first year representing our area in the State Legislature, and have been impressed by her knowledge and communications. It is easy for all of us to complain about the things that get done or don't get done in our State Government, but we are all fortunate to have someone like Senator Slama representing us. I know she would want as many of her constituents in the area as possible to come to the HS gymnasium at 7:00 to meet her and bring your questions you would like her to address.

## 2019/2020 ACT Test Dates

The remaining ACT testing dates and registration deadlines for the 2019-2020 school year are listed below.

Students must electronically submit a photo with the application and the admission ticket will have the student's picture printed on it. When students go to take the test, they must have a state or school issued picture ID (driver's license, school ID card, etc. and their ACT admission ticket. They will not be allowed to test without those two items. All students must also indicate the school they attend when registering. Johnson County Central High School's school code number is 282-319. Students choose their testing location as a part of the registration process. Many JCC students test in Auburn, but there are other test center options in other area locations.

Students may register online at www.actstudent.org. Online registration is possible $24 / 7$ on any computer connected to the internet. A credit or debit card must be used to pay fees online. (Fee Waivers are available for juniors and seniors who qualify-see Mrs. Reuter for waiver eligibility).

## Applications Open: Horatio Alger Scholarships/ Aksarben Scholarships

Seniors who are US citizens, who have a cumulative GPA of at least a 2.0 , who are involved in extra-curricular and community service activities, who display integrity and perseverance in overcoming adversity, and who demonstrate critical financial need ( $\$ 55,000$ or lower adjusted gross family income) are encouraged to apply for Horatio Alger scholarships including Nebraska Aksarben scholarships. The application deadline is October $25^{\text {th }}$, however seniors should start applying now as the application is quite long and requires supporting materials. ## Apply Now: Heisman High School Scholarship

Applications are now open to apply for a Heisman High School scholarship. There will be a winner from every school, 88 state winners, 10 national finalists, and 2 national winners. At the state level and beyond, scholarship amounts are anywhere from $\$ 500$ to $\$ 5000$. Students can apply if they have at least a 3.0 cumulative GPA, if they have participated in at least one high school sport all four years, if they consider themselves to be a leader in their school and community, and if they are a positive role model for younger students. The first quarter ended on Thursday, October $17^{\text {th }}$ and Parent-Teacher Conferences were held on Tuesday, October $22^{\text {nd }}$. If you were unable to attend Parent-Teacher Conferences report cards for middle school students were sent home with your child. If the report card hasn't made it home yet, talk to your child. If that doesn't produce the report card, you may contact the school. Please take an interest in your child's academic performance on a daily basis, talk to your child about school, and praise your child when they do well on a particular academic task. Sometimes this small effort will make a huge difference in a child's academic success. Parental involvement is one of the main ingredients to academic success. The date for $2^{\text {nd }}$ Semester Parent-Teacher Conferences has been changed to Wednesday, February 19.

Mark your School calendar! On Tuesday, November $12^{\text {th }}$, Johnson County Central will host the ECNC Middle School and High School Honor Choirs. Over 200 Middle School and High School students will practice together all afternoon and put on what is sure to be an outstanding concert that evening starting at 7:00 p.m. in the high school gym.

Every two years the NSAA is responsible for creating football schedules for all schools in Nebraska. At the conclusion of the 2019 season we will begin the next 2-year cycle. As part of this process, each school must declare what classification of football (11-man, 8-man or 6-man) they will play for the next 2 -year cycle. The deadline for schools to submit their declaration of participation is November 30,2019. With our low participation numbers JCC is faced with a tough choice of which classification we want to play at for the next two years. Do we stay 11-man and hope we have enough boys participate so we can complete our schedules and have a JV program. If everyone who is playing football this year, grades $8-11$, plays next year we will have 21 boys participating in football. Of these 21 boys, over half will be Freshmen and Sophomores. This would make it very difficult to play a JV schedule. Our other option is to play 8-man football for the next two years. Of course, this would mean some changes in what our coaches do offensively and defensively. On a positive note, if we choose to play 8 -man, we will be eligible for the 8 -man play-offs for the next two years. If you have strong feelings one way or the other, please contact one of our coaches, administrators or plan to attend our next board meeting on Wednesday, November 13.

The Junior High falls sports teams have concluded their seasons. Logan Topp placed $10^{\text {th }}$ at the ECNC Cross Country Meet. The football, volleyball and cross country teams all gave outstanding effort and worked hard to improve their skills throughout the season and should be commended for their efforts. Outstanding job to the girls and boys who competed for the Thunderbirds this fall, as well as, Football Coaches Scheil, Damme and West, Volleyball Coaches Hunzeker, Fricke, and Cross Country Coaches Weber and Huskey. The boys' basketball team has begun practice, with 16 boys participating with games beginning on December $3^{\text {rd }}$.

Congratulations to Ashlei McDonald and Logan Topp for qualifying for the State Cross Country Championship in Kearney. Ashlei finished $4^{\text {th }}$ and Logan finished $8^{\text {th }}$ in the D-1 District. Great job Ashlei, Logan and Coaches.

## "I Didn't Know!" <br> OR: You Can Be About as Involved and Informed as You Want To Be

We currently have 500 students enrolled at Johnson County Central Public Schools. That's a lot of children and a lot of families.
Here's a few other numbers for you:
-The PTO (Parent-Teacher Organization) has held several meetings that were advertised to the district. Of the 500 children and 310 families in the district, there were 4 families represented at the last PTO meeting who were not school staff families. That is about $1 \%$ of our families to help make decisions that can help $100 \%$ of our students!
-The last Post Prom meeting had 5 families represented for the 53 juniors and seniors. That's $9 \%$ to help make decisions, organize and work for the other 48 families who might have students enjoy prom and post prom.
-There are 106 students in grades 9-12 involved in fall activities. Of the 106 students 37 were represented by a parent working in the concession stand to support the Booster Club whose funds support $100 \%$ of our students involved in activities. That is a $37 \%$ representation.
-The Johnson County School District conducted a series of community input meetings ( 6 to be exact) to provide information about our district and collect feedback from the public. Of roughly 2,100 registered voters, JCC received feedback from about $6 \%$ of those voters.
-There are roughly 120 students involved in Booster Club supported activities. Of those 120 students, the Booster Club had 5 parents, or $4 \%$, of the students represented at the last Booster Club meeting.

I get it. Who wants to go to a meeting? (Well, I actually do know a few people who do!) Maybe that's not your gift; sitting and talking and making decisions. But, there are other ways to get involved. Offering to serve is one of the most readily available. Serving lets others know that you care, and not just about your own child, but about the health and success of everyone. Service is about pride; knowing you did your part in making something a success.

Even just showing up is a service in, and of, itself. Those who tend to be more of the decision makers and organizers can feel a great deal of support just from your presence.

Also, these events and gatherings allow you to see how things are working in your district, and (maybe most importantly) meet and get to know other people.

## Elementary Guidance <br> Go Thunderbirds!

We also talk about what it means to be a good Thunderbird and citizens in our communities. When you walk around the school buildings and in the classrooms, you will see posters about the Thunderbird Way and the expectations for every part of the school.

## Bullying Prevention Unit

In the month of October, students in the elementary have begun their Bullying Prevention Unit, a prosocial/emotional program created by Second Step. Weekly, students watch short videos that we discuss to learn more about: What is Bullying? How can one Prevent Bullying? What should a person do if they are bullied?

Bullying is a very strong word. It is important that students and their families understand what bullying is and what to do if their student is having issues at school. Through lessons, students learn that bullying is a negative behavior that happens over and over, is done on purpose, is something they have not been able to get to stop, and is unfair and one-sided. A focus of The Thunderbird Way is to teach and reinforce Safe and Respectful behaviors among our students, which are also concepts reinforced through the bullying prevention unit. The expectations of respect and safety with our students helps to create a learning atmosphere for all students at JCC. Visit with your student about your expectations of respect and safety as well.
