From the Superintendent February 2020

Greetings!!!



We are in full swing in the second semester and the clock seems like it just gains energy and speed!! Lots going on with things pertaining to JCC. I will touch on a couple of them in some detail, but would encourage you to let me know if you have questions or want to know more about other things happening at school.

At the Board of Education level, we are journeying down a path that could lead to a potential vote of the public on a bond levy that would combine some renovation with new construction to get all of our PreK-12 students to the Tecumseh site. The primary reason that Tecumseh would be the site for the move pertains to the large majority of our students (71%) that live within one mile of the current Tecumseh buildings. Inefficiencies in operations with aging buildings at two different sites are also driving our thoughts about a move to one location, but the safety considerations of shuttling over 200 students twice a day add an element to the discussion that requires attention.

If anything happens, we need to be very specific about costs, programming, and building details. In November, the Board interviewed 3 different architecture firms with the purpose of engaging someone that could provide those types of detail. Clark Enerson Partners (CEP) was chosen to engage in pre-bond design work, which means they will put together designs that suit our needs without charging for their services. They would continue to work side-by-side with us until such time as we would pass a successful bond, whether that was soon or in later years. They have reviewed all the information that was generated from our discussions last year as well as the facility assessments that were conducted, and are just beginning to meet with administrators and Board of Education Building Committee members to better understand what we believe would meet our needs now and in the future.

CEP put together a draft project schedule, and in summary the initial plans would include doing the work to conduct a special election in August. The August date provides the district a substantial savings if the bond were to be successful so that the levy could be assessed for the 20-21 school year, allowing the district access to the dollars necessary to start construction. Their timeline (remember this is a draft) includes:

January – Preliminary Program Verification
February – Preliminary Design
March – Public Survey; Public Information Meetings
April, May – Pubic Information Meetings
June – BOE makes resolution for Special Bond
August 11 – Bond Election

September - Begin Construction/Design Development November thru February – Construction Documents developed March 2021 – Bidding April – Construction begins

It is important to remember that in order to understand the implications regarding future renovation and construction, the specific details must be determined by an architect working in conjunction with other professionals to get the best estimates regarding current construction costs. It is equally important to understand that the district is not subject to expenses for these services until a successful bond is passed by a majority of the people. As the draft schedule suggests, the Board of Education will not make a final decision about how to move forward until the June Board Meeting.

Well, the legislature is back in session and there is talk about addressing school funding and property tax issues again. This discussion has been ongoing for almost a decade now (or longer), and hopes are high that meaningful reform will happen to ease the burden of paying for schooling from our agriculture community. Johnson County Central, like many schools our size, gets a small amount of State Aid from Allocated Income Tax (\$51,955 this past year), but is not eligible to receive equalized dollars that make up the lion's share of Nebraska State Aid. The main bill that will be debated is LB 974, and it looks like the best language yet to give schools like JCC a better chance to receive more from the State. It has a 3 year reduction of property taxes built in with an aid per student amount to replace the property tax income that is lost as a result of the lower valuation. As presented, the bill does not raise income or sales tax, but relies on the projected surplus over the next few years. I would have some concerns that we base these new dollars on a "projected" surplus when we don't really know how much that will amount to. Regardless, it is a good sign that they are at least considering some changes, and hopefully there will be some compromises that will be good for kids.

Speaking of state aid, you all received a slip from the Department of Revenue about State Aid Allocated to Local Subdivisions Within the County. The slips says that JCC received \$403,895.17 in State Aid when in fact the Department of Revenue and the Department of Education are using the same term (state aid) to mean 2 different things. The Department of Revenue's version includes the same NDE State Aid, but adds to that the money we get from the state for Special Education and State Apportionment. The matter is confusing to me, but I was able to track down someone from the Department of Revenue to give me an answer that makes sense. This might all seem like a bit of rambling from me, but if you have further questions, I would be happy to have you come in and we can look at our audit together and compare those numbers to that slip sent out with you taxes. Seems like we make simple things more confusing all the time.

Census Collection Just Around the Corner

It is important for all of our Johnson County Central residents to understand the importance of an accurate accounting of our people for many reasons, but in particular for the benefit of our school. According to information from the US Census Bureau we all need to understand the importance of accuracy because:

- The Census determines how funds are spent for Early Childhood care, K-12 and higher education
- The Census determines how funds are spent for technology training

At Stake in the 2020 Census are some 300 federal programs that distribute more than \$800 billion in federal dollars to states. A recent analysis by George Washington University found that Nebraska in 2016 received just under \$4 billion through such programs. At those funding levels, each person missed in the 2020 Census costs the state about \$21,000 over the 10 years until the next Census. If the state count is off by one-tenth of a percent, it would cost Nebraska \$400 million over those 10 years.

Information regarding the collection will be coming out in Mid-March about how to respond to the invitation to participate. Please make a conscious decision to provide accurate information to the government that will result in benefits for the students at Johnson County Central.

NEWS FROM PRINCIPAL RICK LESTER

Winter is strengthening its grip on us with snow and bitter cold – try and stay warm. The month of February is our first step in preparation for next fall where our students will start pre-registration for the 2020-2021 school year.

What is pre-registration? The students choose their top eight classes and two options – At this time there is no set schedule. Once all pre-registrations are complete we'll plan the class schedule. Every student must sign their pre-registration form and their parent must also sign the form. This gives the parents the opportunity to see their student's class selections and "sign off" on it. Mrs. Reuter, the school counselor, is the final signature on every student's pre-registration form. She reviews each student's class selection to verify they are taking appropriate classes which are required for each grade and are meeting their graduation requirements.

Students will receive their pre-registration forms on Thursday, February 6, 2020. They will be due back to the office on Friday, February 28, 2020. This due date is necessary so that we can plan the class schedule. We try to create a schedule that accommodates the most students with the least amount of conflicts. Once we have the best class schedule created, Mrs. Reuter will personally meet with each student who has a class conflict. A student will only have a class schedule conflict if they are unable to get an eight period class schedule by using their eight selected classes or two options. Mrs. Reuter will than aid them in selecting an additional alternate class until we are able to fill their eight periods with an appropriate schedule.

After we have completed a successful class schedule, I will send out summer pre-registration letters to all students. Around the first week in August, each student will receive this letter which will contain their actual class schedule, complete with periods and teachers for every class. If the students and parents are satisfied with this schedule, nothing more needs to be done before the beginning of school next fall. If students desire to make changes to their class schedule they will have two days (to be announced), to meet with the counselor to make changes prior to the start of school. Students will also have the first five days of the 2020-2021 school year to change their class schedule.

I am encouraging every parent to work with your student to help them plan their 2020-2021 class schedule – your input and encouragement is essential.

JCC's Elementary is currently in the process of choosing a new Reading and ELA (English-Language Arts) curriculum. As part of that process, it is important that our teachers see the prospective curriculum in use and are able to talk with teachers using the curriculum. This will help us decide if the curriculum is a good fit for our school district. Therefore, on Monday, February 24, JCC's elementary staff will be visiting several area schools to view curriculum and visit with their staff. At the conclusion of the visits, JCC staff will convene to discuss their findings and come to some conclusions.

Over the past two years, JCC teachers have been narrowing the curriculum choices for Reading/ELA curriculum by:

- receiving samples of various curriculum to inspect lessons and content.
- meeting with representatives from various publishers via Zoom meetings.
- talking with teachers and staff from other school districts.
- reviewing curriculum alignment using the edreports.org website.

At this time, we have decided that we will be visiting schools with the Reading Wonders curriculum published by McGraw-Hill.

The curriculum should meet several needs:

- 1. Align to current Nebraska ELA/Reading Standards.
- 2. Have components of Phonics, Phonemic Awareness, Fluency, Vocabulary & Comprehension.
- 3. Can meet the needs of English Language Learners.
- 4. Contains materials for resource and special education needs.
- 5. Is approachable and accessible to our students.
- 6. Provides a clear and viable curriculum for our students.

Students must electronically submit a photo with the application and the admission ticket will have the student's picture printed on it. When students go to take the test, they must have a state or school issued picture ID (driver's license, school ID card, etc. and their ACT admission ticket. They will not be allowed to test without those two items. All students must also indicate the school they attend when registering. Johnson County Central High School's **school code number** is **282-319**. Students choose their testing location as a part of the registration process. Many JCC students test in Auburn, but there are other test center options in other area locations.

Students may register online at www.actstudent.org. Online registration is possible 24/7 on any computer connected to the internet. A credit or debit card must be used to pay fees online. (Fee Waivers are available for juniors and seniors who qualify-see Mrs. Reuter for waiver eligibility).
