The Financial Responsibilities of Supporting Education at JCC

Last month I explained what we request of our tax payers in order to provide a high quality education at JCC and how that financial request is obtained. This month, I'm going to delve into how that money is spent on a yearly basis.

Here we go!

The following numbers are according to JCC's 2019 audit:

Student Instruction = \$4,791,723

Student Support Services = \$399,307

Instructional Support Services = \$289,410

General Administration Support Services = \$378,336

Office of the Principal = \$540,254

Central Services = \$69,467

Operation & Maintenance = \$633,917

Student Transportation = \$278,795

Categorical Grants from Corporations/Private Interests = \$205

State Categorical Programs = \$121,935

Federal Programs = \$311,013

Transfers to Other Funds = \$1,200

TOTAL = \$7,815,562

Currently, a one cent (\$0.01) increase in the levy will generate additional funding of \$74,661.92 for JCC.

Our school finances get a lot more detailed than what I've presented above. But, in an attempt to keep this understandable, I've left everything in general categories. Here are a few things to consider that can cost the district money:

- Student needs increase in staff
- Student programs & activities increase in staff, materials, equipment & facilities
- Size of district & domicile distribution increase in transportation
- Facilities more facilities mean more money for upkeep and utilities

Each year, the cost to operate a school goes up slightly. You can usually count on about a 2% increase. However, the last few years at JCC has seen a little over 5%. These increases are fine as long as valuations keep up.

Looking ahead to our future goals as a district, including the construction of a new facility, we will want to keep our costs down with the hopes of passing a bond issue in the near future. With this important and achievable goal in mind, I would like to help get us in a place that, when the time is right, we are ready and able to pass a bond to create a learning environment that will educate future generations. I am confident we have the right people to think creatively about student learning, collaboration and the resources we have to make this work. I am also confident that as we come together on a unified vision for the future of JCC we can provide something wonderful for future generations of our district.

School Bus Stop Arms

Nebraska State Statute 60-6, 175 states:

"(1) Upon meeting or overtaking, from the front or rear, any school bus on which the yellow warning signal lights are flashing, the driver of a motor vehicle shall reduce the speed of such vehicle to not more than twenty-five miles per hour, shall bring such vehicle to a complete stop when the school bus is stopped, the stop signal arm is extended, and the flashing red signal lights are turned on, and shall remain stopped until the flashing red signal lights are turned off, the stop signal arm is retracted, and the school bus resumes motion."



Unfortunately, this continues to be a problem as JCC bus drivers continue to have vehicles drive around the school bus when the stop arm is extended and the red lights are flashing. Please, when you see a school bus (from anywhere) with the stop arm extended and red lights flashing, STOP. Help keep our children safe.

In-School Health Precautions

NEWS FROM HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL RICK LESTER

I would like to give parents a little reminder about our new attendance policies. It has always been the policy of Johnson County Central Public Schools that regular and punctual student attendance is required. The administration is responsible for developing attendance rules and regulations and staff is responsible for assisting in the enforcement of the rules and regulations. Students and parent are responsible for developing behaviors which will result in regular and punctual student attendance.

Good attendance reflects the strong character, desire, and health, both physical and mental. If a student is absent for any reason, that student is not being exposed to the ideas generated by discussions between fellow students and/or their teachers as well as the direct lecture material. Consequently, they miss out on educational experiences.

Parents or guardians are obligated to:

- Notify the school by phone (335-3328), writing, or email (daisy.mejia@jccentral.org) of the reason for each absence. If notification is not provided within two days of the absence, the absence may be considered unexcused.
- Submit a doctor's statement, if requested, for each period of absence due to appointment and/or illness that exceeds five days during a quarter.

Students are obligated to:

- Complete all class work in advance for any absence that can be anticipated.
- Make up all work assigned by teachers as make-up work for the instructional time that has been missed.
- Check out of school at the office if leaving school during the school day.

I would strongly encourage parents and/or guardians to view our attendance policies in our Student/Parent Handbook. All high school students have a copy of the handbook on their school iPad. If you have any questions please contact me at school and I will help you in any way I can.

MIDDLE SCHOOL & ATHLETIC NEWS

Parent-Teacher Conferences were held on September 16 after 6 weeks of school. The benefit to having conferences this early in the year is it allows parents to meet with teachers before the end of the first quarter so any problems can be addressed or positive behaviors can be reinforced. Despite our current conditions we had a pretty good turnout for grades 4-8. Thank you to all parents who took the time and effort to come to conferences and meet with their child's teachers. One of the most important factors in determining student academic success is parent involvement. I encourage all parents to make time to discuss study habits and academic progress with their children and monitor each child's grades on Power School on a regular basis.

Students who are remote learning due to choice or long-term quarantine need to make sure they are communicating with their teachers and meeting classroom requirements and expectations. If there is a classroom Zoom scheduled remote learners need to connect at this time. This is when teachers provide instruction and students can ask questions. Because our teachers are still teaching their regular class schedules, they have very narrow windows throughout the day to meet with our remote learners, making it very difficult to reschedule missed Zooms.

During the first 2 weeks of school all students in grades 4-8 were administered the Measures of Academic Progress or MAP test. These are computerized adaptive tests that provide teachers information that can be used to improve teaching and learning. Results from these tests provide achievement and growth data for each grade level and individual student that will allow our teachers to develop targeted instructional strategies to improve student learning. Students took tests in the subject areas of Reading, Language Usage, Math, and Science. Teachers can use MAP growth data to pinpoint the instructional areas our students are ready to tackle-whether they are on, above or below grade level and can use this data to differentiate instruction and pinpoint individual student needs. Information from these assessments can be used to identify areas of strengths and weaknesses for each individual student and also provide our staff with information on where our curriculum may need some improvement.

Middle school athletics is in full swing as we are in the last half of the fall sports season. The Junior High Football Team is undefeated at this time with 2 games to play. The Junior High Volleyball Team is improving by the day and our Junior High Cross Country runners are competing at a high level. These student-athletes are working hard to improve their fundamentals and come together as a team, and are committing a great deal of time and effort to participate. There are still a few opportunities to watch our teams play at home. Come out and support the Thunderbirds! Keep up the good work, Coaches and Athletes!

Getting your Influenza (Flu) shot this year is even more important this year due to the prevalence of COVID in the United States and around the world. The combination of COVID and Influenza at the same time, or one right after the other, can be difficult on your general health, but more so on your respiratory health. This year, in the midst of the coronavirus pandemic, getting the flu vaccine is extra important for your health and the health of others around you.

Experts from the CDC and across the US and around the world have strongly encouraged all qualified people to consider getting an Influenza or FLU Vaccine this year. Don't forget that while the flu virus has a vaccine, tens of thousands of people with the flu are hospitalized each year. Because Influenza and COVID share many (but not all) symptoms, including fever, chills, cough, sore throat, muscle and body aches, headache, and fatigue, it is difficult to determine whether it is one versus the other. The symptoms of loss of taste and smell are specific symptoms related to COVID. Please contact your healthcare provider if you have questions or concerns about what your illness symptoms could be caused by.

While the Flu Vaccine is not always 100% perfect in preventing you from getting one of the flu viruses, the vaccine can lessen the severity of a person's influenza symptoms, even if you do get the flu.

October and November are prime times to get your Influenza (Flu) vaccination. We would encourage you to contact your healthcare provider to check for the availability of a flu vaccine for this fall/winter season. Remember, it takes 2 weeks after you receive your flu shot to achieve full immunity.

Also, if you would have any extra water bottles to share—please have your child bring them to school and we will wash and have some to share with those who forget their water bottle.
