COVID

No doubt, COVID-19 has had a huge impact on all of us. Planning for the school year took on a new meaning as what goes on at school can greatly impact our community. Even though we are halfway through the school year, there are still many questions to be answered about what the rest of the school year will look like. We have our current school calendar, however depending on the illness and how it is impacting our world, minor changes may need to be made. As in past situations, I will try to communicate any changes to the public as quickly as possible. Looking forward, we hope to finish this school year with as much in-school learning as possible while also attempting to safely provide our students with all the opportunities, activities, and experiences we can.

The staff at JCC are fully committed to providing the best educational experience they possibly can. When our high school went to a hybrid-orange schedule, the teachers went without their regular planning periods and their duty free lunches. One staff member said they "would do whatever it takes to make it work". The Tecumseh Site Elementary staff had a long discussion about moving to a fully remote school day. Again, there was a resounding, unified response of staff wanting to work together and make whatever sacrifices they needed to make to provide in-school learning. The concerns about going remote always were centered around the children. Who would watch them? If they are alone, will they get enough to eat? Who will help them?

To have in-person school through COVID takes more work. However, your teachers and staff are willing to put in the time and effort. This means elementary students are eating lunch in their classrooms, desks and chairs are being sanitized regularly, the organization of the classroom has been modified to allow for distancing of students, transparent barriers have been put in place, masks and sanitizer have been supplied in bulk, students are asked to space out CONSTANTLY. It is a tough thing for students to stay apart. They naturally want to be together. This all takes much added planning on the part of the teaching staff to accommodate needs for both on-site learners and remote learners. It takes a lot more work to do anything with a pandemic.

With individuals undergoing quarantine or isolation, substitute teachers have been scarce. I taught 2nd grade for over a week and Physical Education for several days. Dr. Galen Boldt and Laurie Badertscher also took turns in PE and in elementary classrooms. Marsha Bacon and Rich Bacon have subbed in multiple situations at the Cook Site between the elementary and the middle school settings. Mr. Lester and all the high school teachers have been helping out by subbing in classrooms during planning periods. The point is, we have a committed staff determined to make things work for our students without complaint. It hasn't been easy. But, at the end of the day, it is still rewarding work!

Dr. Galen Boldt Assistant Superintendent 402-335-3320 Having a staff member such as Registered Nurse Lisa Kuhl has been invaluable. Although it is not a perfect science, she has worked well beyond the school day and into the weekends to make sure students and staff with COVID, or those with symptoms, are identified, communicated with and are able to safely recover at home. She also walks through each case from the day of symptoms or a positive test, and back through the previous 48 hours to identify anyone who would be a close contact. Then, she contacts all the close contacts to notify them of their next steps. Mrs. Kuhl gets all this done within 24 hours. This is a feat as most contact tracing outside the school district will take anywhere from 5 to 14 days. Her efforts alone have been instrumental in keeping our school in session.

What does this mean for the future of JCC? I believe we have the kind of people that are willing to do what it takes to give our students the best education and experiences possible with the resources we have.

Budget

Currently, our budget is going right where we want it. The Special Building Fund continues to grow as well as JCC's available cash or cash reserves. Remember, the Special Building Fund is there for any building improvement or for new construction. The available cash, or cash reserve, is budgeted General Fund money on hand for any expenditures. COVID will make its mark on the budget. In the activities fund, we will generate very few gate receipts as open attendance at any event has been extremely limited. Although there have been funds from the federal and state governments, JCC will expend some funds to keep up with the costs of sanitizer and masks.

Building & Grounds

Discussions about a unified JCC at one-site have died down a bit, we continue to keep this goal in sight. NioCorp continues to seek financing for the Elk Creek project, however COVID has slowed progress on this as well. The addition of a NioCorp mine in the Johnson County Central school district would certainly help with the additional valuations it would bring, in turn having the potential to lower the tax asking of our local landowners. This does not stop us from continuing to plan and prepare for a future site and facility. Until that time, we will continue to take care of what we do have; to make both sites and all three buildings, facilities that our communities can be proud of. This is not always an easy task, but one that JCC is willing to take on and do well. Russ Waring and Larry Naber spend countless hours problem solving, diagnosing, calling for guidance and finding the right people to keep our facilities operating at a high level. Running between two sites, getting to know various HVAC (Heating, Ventilation, Air Conditioning) systems and learning about all the nuances of the various time period construction and components of the facilities is a challenge. However, JCC has the right people of the right mind to get the job done right.

Community

We have had times in our community when we have felt closer together. I believe there have been times when we've felt farther apart. The strong sense of community and support I've felt throughout the COVID pandemic has been overwhelming. It is this support that helps all of us manage the situation with confidence and hope. It is my goal at JCC to continue to build a sense of unity within the district. The best way this is done, in my opinion, is through talking with and investing in people. Relationships. Investment. Both of these lead to a sense of unity, community, and pride. We have to be willing to reach out. We have to be willing to accept help. We have to be willing to take a chance. We have to be willing to disagree and then move on together. We have to be willing to invest. I understand not everyone will, but I also have faith that there are those that will invest and will make an impact.



Assistant Superintendent Report - December

I want to begin by saying it has been a privilege to serve this school district for the past 2 ½ years, 2 of which in the role of interim superintendent. Coupled with my prior service to Tecumseh Public Schools for 7 years, I have enjoyed renewing acquaintances as well as forging new ones. It has been interesting for me, as well, to get a better understanding of the circumstances surrounding the history of how Johnson County Central was born into existence. In my prior role as principal and boys' basketball coach at Tecumseh, I got to know Nemaha Valley administrators Gary Oxley and Gary Anderson very well as I served with Tecumseh administrators Jim Ossian and Tom Rother. I hold each of these men in high esteem, understanding that I learned from each of them and carried many of the lessons into the remaining 27 years of my administrative career. Nemaha Valley and Tecumseh both enjoyed success in many different areas, and both schools were characterized by a tremendous spirit embraced by staff, students, and patrons of each community. My last year at Tecumseh was 1988, and in my return 20 years later as the Interim Superintendent, I have had the cause to reflect about the changes that have led to the consolidated school district and thoughts about what the future holds for the district's students. My thoughts can be summarized as follows:

- The people are still the same......I mean, everyone is community oriented, hard-working, school supporting, fun-to-be-around, and kid-centered. The circumstances of the last few years where property tax issues have caused everyone to pause and think about how we can be good stewards and still be educationally progressive have been hard. The issues of COVID-19 have compounded the challenges with implementing procedures that limit the spread of the virus, preventing teachers from returning to the teaching strategies they have refined over years of experience, and causing our students the loss of a normalcy that has eliminated time honored traditions of many years. Through it all, the students, staff, patrons, and community members still represent the best of what Nebraska Schools should be.
- The property tax issues look to be stabilized. The Unicameral seems to have come to an agreement about the best way to provide property tax relief, and the passage of the gambling initiatives look to provide more revenue to the state directly tied to helping fund our schools. While the resulting changes might not be exactly what we want at JCC, they at least will provide the opportunity to plan future budgets with a degree of certainty where the funding will come from. I hope that discussions about equity in State Aid distribution will continue to focus on those schools who are not receiving equalization aid currently, and how that might happen in the future. In addition, the prospects of a vaccine to fight COVID-19 appears to be imminent. With the good news of the science behind the urgency to develop a vaccine, the prospects for returning to schooling that looks like learning that we all recognize, seems to be close at hand. This represents a development that allows all of us to embrace a hope that better times are ahead.
- In my reflection on the past 2 ½ years I cannot escape a viewpoint that is uncomfortable for me to express, yet comes through as reality. The consolidation of the two school districts was successful in merging land values and creating new learning opportunities, yet the spirit of community consolidation remains incomplete. I get the feeling that there are issues that some folks in each of the individual communities that comprise the JCC community are holding on to that prevent a unity of purpose. I'm not talking about the students here, but the patrons that

remember the schools as they were before the consolidation. As a matter of fact, I see JCC students as some of the finest students that I have been privileged to be around. In a school that can boast of wonderful diversity, our kids do not recognize differences but embrace each other as individuals of worth because of who they are. Our adult community would do well to embrace the same concepts. Don't get me wrong, there could be plenty of reasons why we have not consolidated the spirit of the two individual schools, and you could make an argument for a wide array of rational thinking including:

- Our best facilities are at the Cook site
- The Tecumseh site is not big enough to put all of our students
- The expenses of a building project are too great for our district to handle
- The time is not right to be thinking of new construction

I'm sure there are many other things that could be added to this list and many things that happened 10, 20, or 30 years ago that could contribute to hard feelings about what happened. The fact is, we all need to "get over" whatever these issues of the past are, and embrace the issues of creating the environment needed to help our students pursue their hopes and dreams moving forward. It's easy to get trapped in a time warp of who to blame about the past, but it is also exciting to think about how pulling together in one purpose means for the future.

The future for this school district is as bright as any school in Nebraska. The Board of Education has made a fundamental decision that will have a lasting impact on the quality of JCC when they hired Jon Rother to be the superintendent of schools. Jon's familiarity with the district and his commitment to the community provide him insight that few others would have. He has demonstrated tremendous leadership in his past roles at Tecumseh and Johnson County Central and will only improve as a leader with experience. In addition, the staff at JCC is as good-as-it-gets!!! I see people dedicated to putting the needs of students first and working together to "git 'er done"! This attribute has been on full display working through the challenges of educating students during a pandemic. My observation saw every staff member taking the challenge of remote learning, dealing with a reduction in available staff, maintaining a safe environment, and furthering the education of individual students while working countless hours beyond what the normal school day would require. The Board of Education has taken some bold steps to pursue the purchase of land for potential new construction, and has been advised by some outstanding professionals who can help them make the best plan for a new school. While the timeline for actual building has not been determined, they are determined to set the stage for generations to come by providing quality schooling while maintaining good stewardship principles. They have demonstrated the practice of being efficient with every day spending and will find the right combinations of potential staff reductions while still meeting the needs of students by spending tax dollars wisely. Throw in the high prospects of additional property tax revenue from the Niocorp project that could be a



Sign Up for the February, 2021 ACT Test Now

Students interested in signing up for the February 6th ACT, should do so now. The deadline to sign up without paying late fees is January 9th. They can sign up to take the test at any available test center. The closest test centers for the February test are located in Auburn, Beatrice, Nebraska City, Falls City, and Lincoln. Students sign up online at <u>www.act.org.</u> The cost to test is \$55. Students on free/reduced lunch may get this fee waived. They need to ask for a waiver form from Mrs. Reuter. They can use up to two of these waivers during their high school years.

Seniors: Apply for a Susan Buffett Foundation Scholarship Now

Apply for a Susan Buffett Foundation Scholarship if you are eligible. The online application for this program is open from November 1st to February 1st. As part of the application, students must attach a seven-semester high school transcript. Seniors can request their seven-semester transcript from me starting on January 7th. They can complete all other parts of the application before then. For more information and to apply, visit <u>https://buffettscholarships.org/</u>

To be eligible for a scholarship from The Susan T. Buffett Foundation, a student must:

- Be a resident of Nebraska
 - O Residency is determined by the institution where you enroll
- Graduate from a Nebraska high school or earn a Nebraska GED
- Achieve at least a 2.0 cumulative unweighted GPA in high school
- Be a first-time freshman when entering college
 - O Students obtaining dual enrollment credits in high school are still eligible to apply
 - 0 Nebraska Community Colleges CCC, MCC, MPCC, NECC, SCC, or WNCC;
 - 0 Nebraska State College System Chadron State, Peru State, Wayne State; or
 - 0 University of Nebraska NCTA, UNK, UNL, UNMC, or UNO
- Be in need of financial assistance in order to attend school
 - O Note: Students do not need to be Pell Grant eligible to qualify.
 - O Students must have an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) on the FAFSA below \$10,000. Students' EFC numbers are on the SAR form that they receive after they complete the FAFSA online. Many students end up qualifying to apply because this scholarship allows higher family income levels than many need-based scholarships.

Seniors: Complete the FAFSA as Soon as Possible

- First, create an FSA ID for you and one for a parent at fsaid.ed.gov. You'll need it to access and sign the FAFSA. Click here for instructions.


