With the spring season also comes a variety of activities and events that can disrupt the regular school week, such as, Easter, Standardized tests, State Standards and Assessments, quiz bowl competitions, music concerts and competitions, and track meets to name a few. With the busy time of year and the nice, spring weather, many of us anxiously await the end of the school year and summer vacation. It is important to remember that we still have about a month and a half of school left and there is a lot of work that remains. Everyone needs to guard against complacency and try to finish the year strong.

Students will be taking a number of state-mandated assessments (NSCAS) throughout the month of April. These assessments are very important for our students and the district. Results from these assessments provide data which help guide curriculum decisions for our district. Results from these assessments will also be used to help determine a student's academic placement for the next school year. As the testing dates approach there are some test-taking strategies and some things parents can do to help their children be successful on these assessments:

- Make sure your child gets a good night's sleep the night before each test and eats a good breakfast the morning of the tests.
- Have your child dress in layers studies show children do better on assessments if they don't have to think about how hot or cold they are.
- Encourage your child to take the tests seriously. A lot of important decisions regarding
 your children and their education are made based on data we receive from these tests. If
 students don't give their best effort on the standardized tests much of our data will be
 invalid, making it difficult to make decisions that will be in the best interests of our
 students.
- Keep a good attitude. Think positively!

Students in grades K-3 have been learning about Internet Safety, Community Safety and Careers in guidance classes. Resources were used from Netsmartz Kids for the lessons in Kindergarten through third grade. More information can be found at the following web address: https://www.netsmartzkids.org/. Students in grades 4 and 5 learned about cyberbullying: what it is and how it can affect others. Students in grades K-8 learn about online safety and Digital Citizenship each year. Below are some of the items we address at the different grade levels.

Be Smart About Internet Safety



Before you post something on the Internet, think how it may affect you or those around you:

- It's hard to retrieve and delete something once it is on the Internet.

 rule of thumb, once it is on the Internet, it is there forever.
- Never send pictures to strangers.
- Keep passwords private (except from your parents).
 - For example, at school, if a student is logged in as you and in an inappropriate site, you would face the consequences.
- Tell an adult if something mean or inappropriate has been done to you when you are online. It is important to talk to your child about telling a trusted adult if something they see makes them uncomfortable.
- Limit the amount of time you spend on the Internet. At home, 30 minutes a day is a maximum time recommendation for a student in 4^{th} or 5^{th} grade.
- Never provide personal information like a phone number, address, best friend's name, or picture.

If you Use Online Social Sharing Networks such as TikTok, YouTube or Instagram:



- Have you given away your identity and location (name, school, address, age, phone)?
 - this includes programs that want to use your location
- Do you know all of your Friends? You should only "friend" someone that you feel you would talk to if you saw them in person.
- The computer/phone/tablet or other device should be in a common area of the house, parents should be able to monitor your online activity.
- The information you post is not private. If any information could be viewed as harassment of another student, consequences at school include meetings with parents and administrators, a warning, suspension, or expulsion.
 - * If your parents, teachers or friends cannot see it, you should not be doing it.*

Digital Citizenship Presentation

Last school year, the JCC school attorney, Ms. Karen Haase from KSB School Law presented to students in grades 4-12 about Digital Citizenship. Karen Haase and the KSB law firm believe passionately that schools should use technology to increase engagement and student achievement. They are a leading authority in Nebraska who educate teachers and students how to appropriately integrate digital citizenship with education. A digital citizen is a person who utilizes information technology in order to engage in society, politics, and government and who uses the internet regularly and effectively. Ms. Haase discussed legal issues related to students' use of social media and other online mediums. She utilized humor, statistics, summaries of real-life cases to explain to students the significant consequences attached to the inappropriate use of social media such as TikTok, Instagram and Snapchat. Staff continue to uses items she shared as resources to help our students develop into positive digital citizens.

If your student is in grades 8-11 currently and in band, please be looking for more information on this once school starts in August. One final note, Summer is a great time to take your student's instrument into Dietze to get it looked over and cleaned. They have multiple locations in Lincoln and Omaha and a great job of working with you on what repairs/ adjustments may be needed and by priority.

Individual letters will be sent in April to the parents of all Kindergarten ready students residing in Johnson County Central's school district. If you do not receive a letter, please call the school and let us know that you will be attending the 2021 Kindergarten Round-Up.

If applying for early registration (child will be 5 years old on or after August 1 and on or before October 15), JCC must have received your written request by March 12, 2021.

JCC Preschool Enrollment is Open February 1, 2021

We know you are your child's first and most important teacher, and we would love to join you in the education of your young learner.

Our focus is to provide learning opportunities for those students who will be entering kindergarten the following year. Therefore, the majority of our enrollment will be filled by prekindergarten students. **Prekindergarten** is defined as a child who will be four years of age on or before July 31, 2021. A **three-year-old** is defined as a child who will be three years of age on or before July 31, 2021. Being potty trained is a requirement of the program. We offer a full-day program for prekindergarten students in Tecumseh and Cook. Three-year-olds will join the morning of the full-day program. Preschool is in session Tuesday through Friday.

The preschool schedule encompasses discovery through active involvement. "The Creative Curriculum" program is implemented. Activities, materials, and equipment reflect and respect the diversity of race and multiculturalism and the physical and mental abilities of all children.

There is no tuition fee for preschool. However, breakfast and/or lunch fees will be charged when applicable. An application for free and reduced meals will be offered at orientation.

Transportation will be provided between sites as well as to and from licensed child care providers within close geographic proximity of the attending site at no cost.

Enrollment will be filled according to the following criteria: Rule 11 guidelines, students currently enrolled in our program, and the date an application is received. If interested in the preschool program, please complete the electronic application which is available on the school website: www.jccentral.org. If you would prefer a paper application, please contact the elementary office at 402-335-3320.

Resilience and Grit: Developing a Positive Mindset

This past month students in grades 3-8 have been learning about GRIT (Growth; Resilience; Integrity; Tenacity) utilizing lessons from Dr. Angela Duckworth, an assistant professor at the University of Pennsylvania. She defines "grit" as sticking with things over the long term until you master them." Essentially, it is having passion and sustained persistence applied to achieve long-term goals. Students then created an academic goal to help engage them as active learners in the lessons taught at school, to help make them more purposeful. A major component of grit is resilience; an individual's ability to bounce back after they have struggled, faltered or failed. Each year we work with students to develop a growth mindset, to understand that they have control over many aspects of their education and lives including their effort, attitude and willingness to work to get better at items that are difficult.

Individuals who develop a growth mindset understand that learning and intelligence are not fixed, that students can become more intelligent with effort; that putting forth extra time and work can lead to higher achievement. Lessons taught about a Growth Mindset are based on the teachings of Dr. Carol Dweck, a professor of psychology at Stanford University. By developing a growth mindset, students change their attitudes from "I can't do that" to "I can't do that, <u>vet.</u>" The purpose of the lessons is to again reinforce the notion that students have control over many aspects of their educational journey, based on their effort, attitude and willingness to to work more on items that are difficult.

At school, we apply these beliefs to lessons in the classroom. In addition to classroom instruction, other items teachers use to help students persist in their educational journey include: IXL is an online educational tool that helps students learn and master concepts in math, reading and language arts; Reading Eggs, an app that supports the development and growth of reading, spelling, writing and phonics; Prodigy, an app that supports math growth in grade content areas; ABC Mouse, an app that supports the development and growth of reading and writing skills; Accelerated Reader (AR) and AR tests upon completion of a book; Goal-setting for AR, MAP and other assessments. IXL and Prodigy both align to the Nebraska State Standards. Students who develop a Growth Mindset and demonstrate Grit in their learning also often display other mentally strong characteristics. Amy Morin, a psychotherapist and Editor-In-Chief of the Verywell Mind recently wrote an article about 7 characteristics that children with mental toughness display:

- 1) They empower themselves
- 2) They adapt to change
- 3) They know when to say no
- 4) They own their mistakes
- 5) They celebrate other people's successes
- 6) They fail...and try again
- 7) They persist

As parents and educators, it is important to help our children and students develop grittiness; resilience; a growth mindset; mental toughness. Developing these characteristics will help to empower them, to help them feel more in control of their education and their futures. As we continue the 2020-21 school year into spring and fourth quarter, students are also starting to prepare for their state assessments, known as the NSCAS (Nebraska Student Centered Assessment System). Students in grades 3-8 will participate in state assessments through the month of April (please see the school calendar for testing dates). Students in grades 3-8 will take the English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics assessments. In addition grades 5 & 8 take a Science assessment. The NSCAS are summative assessments that measure student performance against Nebraska's content area standards. The results will determine whether students learned what they were expected to learn. Students are scored in each tested area as: Developing; On Track; College and Career Ready. These are important assessments the school district utilizes to help check for learning, make curriculum decisions and to earn academic honors such as The Presidential Academic Award for students in grades 5 and 8.

Encourage your student(s) to continue to grow through the school year. Visit with them about the Accelerated Reader (AR) book they are reading; what AR level are they currently reading at? How many reading levels have they improved throughout the year? How are they preparing for the NSCAS in Reading, Language Arts, Math or Science? We often remind our students at JCC that we are part of a team, we are The Thunderbirds. You are also part of our team. Together, let's help our students Soar!
