Selecting Construction Managers & Building Options

When considering a construction project, schools have three options:

1. Competitive Bid (Design/Bid/Build)

- Most familiar delivery method.
- Linear process with no overlap. The project is designed, bids are accepted and the build process then takes place.
- Bids are issued after plans and specs are completed by the architect.
- Contractors bid on the proposed project and the lowest, responsible bidder is awarded the job.
- Architects picked by the owner and report directly to the owner.

2. Construction Manager at Risk (CM, CMAR or CM@R)


- Owner interviews and selects a CM firm based upon qualifications and experience, before the design and bidding documents are complete.
- The CM and architect work together to develop and estimate design.
- Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) is provided by the CM during design phase. Next, proposals are received and subcontracts are awarded to subcontractors.
- Any unused contingency at the end of the project is returned to the owner.
- The architect team is selected separately and reports to the owner.

3. Design Build (D/B)

- Contractor and architect one team.
- GMP is provided early in the process by the D/B team based upon design criteria prepared by the owner.
- The D/B team develops drawings that complete the design, while staying below the furnished GMP. The D/B team will then receive proposals from subcontractors and award subcontracts.

At the May 2021 JCC school board meeting, the board passed a resolution and policy in regards to hiring a Construction Manager at Risk. Considering the size and scope of building a new facility, the board felt the following advantages and long-term savings of hiring a CMAR would outweigh the additional costs:

- The selection of a CM is based on qualifications, experience and team.
- A CM provides design assistance in budgeting and planning.
- Continuous budget control possible.
- Quality screening of subcontractors.
- More teamwork between CM and Architect.
- Because of their experience in managing construction projects, a CMAR reduces change orders and claims once in construction.
- Best for Schedule sensitive projects, difficult design, large or new renovation projects, multiple phase projects, technical complexity or multi-disciplinary coordination.

This committee will do the following: receive Requests for Proposals (RFPs) from potential CMARs, determine which CMARs to interview, conduct the interviews, and then rank ordering the CMARs for recommendation to the board. When the board determines the preferred CMAR is determined, negotiations with that firm would then take place. Should an agreement be reached, a contract would be drawn between Johnson County Central and the firm.

An additional option for community input

If you've been following along with the newsletter articles, two options for building phases have been discussed.

Build a PK-6 building and bring the middle school into the current high school.

OR

Build a 7-12 building and transform the current high school into a PK-6 building.

Some of the feedback I have received (thank you to those who took the time to share your opinions) asks that we consider a third option for community input. This third option is for the complete PK-12 building to be done in one phase. Our preliminary numbers put the dollars for building such a facility at \$57 million dollars. Therefore, JCC's administrative team will be scrutinizing the most current suggested room arrangements and square footage for a potential PK-12 school building. We will be working to remove any unneeded spaces, or to cut down square footage on spaces that may not need to be as big and hopefully come up with a more palpable PK-12 number as a third option.

Johnson County Central Public Schools School Improvement External Team Report 2021

In order for a school in Nebraska to be recognized for legal operation for the purposes of state law, that school must be "accredited". Accreditation rules for schools in the State of Nebraska are found in the Nebraska Department of Education under Rule 10. Section 009 in Rule 10 contains the requirements for "Continuous School Improvement". Continuous School Improvement is defined as:

"A systematic on-going process guides planning, implementation, and evaluation and renewal of continuous school improvement activities to meet local and statewide goals and priorities. The school improvement process focuses on improving student learning. The process includes a periodic review by visiting educators who provide consultation to the local school/community in continued accomplishment of plans and goals."

The school improvement process is a five year cycle of setting goals, adopting strategies to meet those goals, defining ways to measure the goals and determining if the goals have been met. The "visiting educators" mentioned above is referred to as the "external team". 2020-2021 was the final year of our most recent five year cycle for continuous improvement. Therefore, on March 14 and 15, an external team of visiting educators came to Johnson County Central to review our school improvement plan and give feedback. Here's what they found:

Process Commendations: (Successful activities, procedures and accomplishments in the overall progress of the continuous school improvement process)

Overall CIP Process

- 1. There is a clear and meaningful mission statement
- 2. Well structured CIP Process
- 3. All staff is included in the process

Educational Opportunities and Access

- 1. Strong Technology Department (provided Hotspots for virtual learning during COVID)
- 2. Variety of Course Offerings

Transitions

- 1. Empathy and support of the students with diverse backgrounds.
- 2. Transition and support activities as students move from the Tecumseh site to the Cook site for middle school and then back to the Tecumseh site for high School.

Positive Partnerships, Relationships, and Success

- 1. Communication-all stakeholders agree that communication is a strength.
 - 2. Positive school culture and climate.

- 3. Everyone values the diversity of the school community.
- 4. Every adult interview group wanted better facilities for the students, however, the students valued the relationships and the education they receive over facilities.

Educator Effectiveness

- 1. Marzano Framework
- 2. Exemplary student-teacher relationships
- 3. Longevity and experience of staff
- 4. Thunderbird Way (PBIS)

Student Achievement and Growth

- 1. The primary focus is on individual growth not cohort proficiencies
- 2. Data shows that the reading comprehension goal has been met.

Postsecondary, Career, and Civic Readiness

- 1. SENCAP and Dual-credit classes
- 2. College access grant and college visits
- 3. ACT nights
- 4. Interest inventories and four-year plans

Continuous Improvement Process Recommendations: (Advice and suggestions for consideration concerning the overall continuous school improvement process)

Overall CIP Process

- 1. Continue the strategic planning process with all stakeholders.
- 2. Stay informed of the changing rule 10 and state accreditation process.

Educational Opportunities and Access

- 1. Continued professional development focused on district initiatives and Technology.
- 2. Encourage students to enroll in the dual credit courses and engage in post secondary career planning and exploration.

Transitions

- 1. Develop an immersion plan for new students
- 2. Formalize a plan for transition between buildings to include communication about activities and clubs.

Positive Partnerships, Relationships, and Success

- 1. Continue to keep stakeholders informed.
- 2. Continue to build a positive culture, climate, and academic success through the MTSS process district-wide.
- 3. Continue to build trust of the diverse family population.
- 4. Continue the strategic plan for facilities.
- *Note: The external team did not make a facility recommendation. However, it was important to note that this is very much a priority for this district.

Educator Effectiveness

- 1. Align professionals goals to the Marzano Framework.
- 2. Build professional development opportunities based on the Marzano Goals.
- 3. Continue to develop the MTSS process K-12 so that they are sustainable.
- 4. Continue to grow the Thunderbird Way through the high school.

Student Achievement and Growth

- 1. Utilize the MTSS process to address the subgroup deficiencies.
- 2. Explore additional instructional strategies aligned to the school improvement goal.

Postsecondary, Career, and Civic Readiness

- 1. Encourage enrollment in SENCAP and dual-credit classes
- 2. Explore community resources for post-secondary opportunities and work study partnerships.
- 3. Formalize a student portfolio process starting in junior high.

School Improvement Goal


JCC's goal was that "All Students Will Improve in Reading Comprehension". The goals were measured using the following assessments:

- MAP (Measures of Academic Progress)
- ACT
- NSCAS (Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System)
- STAR (Standardized Test for the Assessment of Reading).

As part of JCC's strategy, or intervention, to help students reach their reading goals, teachers and staff implemented graphic organizers with students. The research behind graphic organizers is that they help students organize information to determine main ideas and critical information. At the conclusion of the external teams' visit and after reviewing student data, the team determined that JCC had met its' goal!

As you can see, this process is long and very involved. I would like to thank Mrs. Robyn Faris for her last ten (10) years of work as JCC's School Improvement Coordinator! Robyn has put in countless hours emailing, organizing, meeting with staff, making phone calls and collecting materials. We couldn't have done it without her! Through her efforts, JCC was thoroughly prepared for our external visit with very few questions asked.

JCC's next steps are to look at our student data again this summer, we will set new goals and continue on the path of improvement!

BACK TO SCHOOL PHYSICALS...

It is time to start thinking about physicals for sports and school participation.

- ALL Kindergarten students (entering school for the first time) are required to receive a physical/vision screening, and immunization screening from a healthcare provider.
- ALL 7th grade students are required to receive a school physical with immunizations reviewed for booster shots if needed.
- ALL students transferring from out-of-state require a school physical/vision screening, and immunization screening.
- ALL students, grades 7-12, that plan to participate in athletics will need a sports physical.

NSAA physical forms are available at the Tecumseh and Cook sites. Please bring completed physical clearance forms to your child's school after their physical is completed.

*Please call your healthcare provider to schedule an appointment.

ALL PHYSICALS MUST BE COMPLETED PRIOR TO THE START OF SCHOOL, AND PRIOR TO THE START OF THE FALL ATHLETIC SEASON FOR ALL ATHLETES. Coaches will need to receive completed physical forms prior to an athlete's participation in practice.

Hopefully, report cards have been received by the time this newsletter is printed. In addition to your student's report card is MAP report from this spring's administration of the assessment. If you haven't received your student's report card, please contact the office.

Each student, grades 7-12, who plan to participate in NSAA sponsored activities during the 2021-2022 school year need to turn in a signed Parental Consent form. This must be done before a student is eligible for practice and competition in <u>any</u> activity that is under the jurisdiction of the Nebraska School Activities Association. By signing this consent form parents and students acknowledge that they understand there are risks involved in any activity. This parental consent form must be on file at school for every student who participates in NSAA activities.

All 7th grade students, and any student grades 8-12, who expects to participate in athletic contests shall present to the school representative once each year, a physician's certificate on a form recommended by the NSAA that he/she is physically fit for athletic participation. This physical examination must be given during the school year in which the student participates or during the summer vacation period which precedes the school year in which the individual participates. Also, all incoming 7th graders, freshmen and juniors must complete the ImPact Concussion test to establish a baseline in the event of a head injury. This test will be conducted by school officials and must be done before an athlete is allowed to practice or participate in a contact sport (football, volleyball, basketball, wrestling, jumping events in track & field).

Parental consent forms and physical evaluation forms can be picked up in the office at both sites. All athletes who plan to participate in a fall sport need to take care of this prior to the beginning of fall practice on August 16, 2021.



Preschool Enrollment 2021-22

We know you are your child's first and most important teacher, and we would love to join you in the education of your young learner.

The Johnson County Central Preschool Program has openings available for the 2021-22 school year. **Prekindergarten** is defined as a child who will be four years of age on or before July 31, 2021. A **three-year-old** is defined as a child who will be three years of age on or before July 31, 2021. Being potty trained is a requirement of the program. We offer a full-day program for prekindergarten students at both sites. Three-year-olds will join the morning of the full-day program. Preschool is in session Tuesday through Friday.

The preschool schedule encompasses discovery through active involvement. "The Creative Curriculum" program is implemented and activities, materials, and equipment reflect and respect the diversity of race and multiculturalism and the physical and mental abilities of all children.

There is no tuition fee for preschool. However, breakfast and/or lunch fees will be charged when applicable. An application for free and reduced meals will be offered at orientation.

Transportation will be provided from the Tecumseh site to the Cook site in the morning as well as back to the Tecumseh site at the end of the school day. Transportation will also be provided to and from licensed child care providers within close geographic proximity of the attending site at no cost.

Enrollment will be filled according to the following criteria: Rule 11 guidelines, students currently enrolled in our program, and the date an application is received. If you would prefer a paper application, please contact the school.
