## Thunderbird Nation

Who we are geographically, where we reside and how our numbers classify us for activities.

While serving JCC first as a teacher, then principal, and now as superintendent, I spend a lot of time thinking about how we can best serve the students of our district. Oftentimes, the simple logistics of moving students to and from various locations impacts the services we can cost effectively provide.


Geographically speaking, we have a relatively large school district that stretches approximately 297 square miles. But, as the above map illustrates, this is the case with some of our neighboring districts as well. It is because of these "stretched" district boundaries that I often receive questions about where our students and staff all live.

As of this writing, JCC serves 508 students with over 90 staff (which includes anyone that coaches, drives a bus, etc.). The following charts are a breakdown of where our students and staff reside based on their residence city address.

Frequently when discussing the "Where do all our kids live?" question, the topic of option enrollment is brought up. As such, I feel it is important to understand how option enrollment affects our district.

First off, whenever a family options into our district, I know we will provide the incoming family an excellent school that has a caring, qualified staff to educate their students regardless of needs and/or backgrounds. I believe we provide an educational environment in which all students can thrive. In the instances where families choose to option out, they do so for various reasons. The three most common are:

* Proximity to their home.
* Proximity to their workplace.
* Identify more with the option district (alma mater, family, etc.)

The funding of option enrollment also seems to be a little bit misunderstood. A few clarifications that I will offer:

1. A school district does not lose money when a student options out of the district.
2. If a family resides in a district (home district) and chooses to option out of that district, their property tax dollars stay in the home district.
3. A school district only receives money for option enrollment if the number of students optioning in surpasses the number of students optioning out. At that point, the school district would receive state aid for option enrollment.

Here's a quick example:
If a school district has 20 students option out and 22 students option in, the school district will receive option enrollment state aid for 2 students. (As of this writing, school districts receve approximately $\$ 10,300$ option funding for each. Therefore, in the example above, the school district would receive about $\$ 20,600$.) If a school district has 20 students option out and 18 students option in, the school district will NOT receive state aid for option enrollment.

As a district, JCC currently "options in" 17 students and "options out" 120 students. Below is a breakdown of these figures:

One never likes to see a student leave our district. But, when you "dig into" the above numbers and examine each individual situation, there is usually a logical reason why the "option in" or "option out" decision was made.

## Enrollment and Activities

Classification for activities is another area of enrollment data. Each year, Nebraska School Activities Association (NSAA) receives enrollment data from Nebraska Department of Education in late October, which NDE receives from each school district at the end of September. These enrollment figures are used to determine a school district's classification in various activities. The enrollment figures submitted to NDE from each school district is the total number of students enrolled in grades 9 through 11, the number of female students in grades 9 through 11 and the number of male students in grades 9 through 11. All activities are re-classified each year with the exception of football. Football is on a two year cycle; meaning football is re-classified every two years.

Girls' sports classifications are determined by the female grades 9 through 11 enrollment only. Boys sports by the male grades 9 through 11 enrollment. The two exceptions for our district are track and cross country. The classifications for both of these sports are determined by total enrollment in grades 9 through 11.

As every school district's enrollment data is subject to change each year, some schools will option down or up a class to stay in their preferred class or where they feel they can be the most competitive. For each sport, definitive enrollment numbers are set for each class. Therefore, some classes for each sport can get bigger or smaller in the number of schools represented depending on their enrollment. School district classifications and reported enrollment numbers can be found at www.nsaa.org under each activity and under the "Schools" tab.

Keeping these things in mind, let's take a look at JCC's current classifications.
Cross Country - Class D (112 total, cutoff for Class D 121)

- Class A \& B: Top 60 largest schools.
- Class A: 850 and above.
- Class B: Remaining largest of the 60.
- Class C: Next 60 largest schools registered for cross country.
- Class D: Remaining school registered for cross country.

Girls Golf - Class C ( 60 girls, cutoff for Class C 113)

- Class A: Top 64 largest schools registered for girls' golf.
- Class B: Remaining registered schools with combined enrollment of 850 and above.
- Class C: Remaining schools after $A$ and B placement.

Football - D1 (47 boys)

- Class A: 425 and above
- Class B: 160-424
- Class C1: 70-159
- Class C2: 69-48
- Class D1 \& D2: 47 and under
- Total is split evenly with top half being D1 and bottom half D2.
- Class D6: 27 and under

Volleyball - C1 (60 girls)

- The top 60 largest schools registered for volleyball shall be in Classes A \& B. Schools with a combined enrollment of 850 and above will be placed in Class $A$. The remaining schools will be placed in Class $B$.
- The remaining schools registered for volleyball are split evenly into four classes; C1, C2, D1, D2, with the additional school being placed in the lower class.

Boys Basketball - C2 (52 boys)

I'm not going to include how NSAA classifies every activity as I believe this gives you a pretty good picture. However, should you want to know more, go to the NSAA website and find the activity you want to research.

One of the big challenges for JCC comes with football. The change between D1 and C2 means playing 8 -man or 11-man football. This is a discussion we will be having soon after the 2021 football season ends, as our "boy" numbers will qualify us for C 2 classification. Should we opt to stay in D1 (8-man), we will have a two year grace period in which we still can be playoff eligible. After the two year grace period, should our numbers still qualify JCC for C 2 football and we opt down to D 1 , the team will not be eligible for the playoffs.

## NEWS FROM PRINCIPAL RICK LESTER

I would like to give parents a little reminder about our attendance policies. It has always been the policy of Johnson County Central Public Schools that regular and punctual student attendance is required. The administration is responsible for developing attendance rules and regulations and staff is responsible for assisting in the enforcement of the rules and regulations. Students and parents are responsible for developing behaviors which will result in regular and punctual student attendance.

Good attendance reflects the strong character, desire, and health, both physical and mental. If a student is absent for any reason, that student is not being exposed to the ideas generated by discussions between fellow students and/or their teachers as well as the direct lecture material. Consequently, they miss out on educational experiences.

Parents or guardians are obligated to:

- Notify the school by phone (335-3328), writing, or email (daisy.mejia@jccentral.org) of the reason for each absence. If notification is not provided within two days of the absence, the absence may be considered unexcused.
- Submit a doctor's statement, if requested, for each period of absence due to appointment and/or illness that exceeds five days during a quarter.

Students are obligated to:

- Complete all class work in advance for any absence that can be anticipated.
- Make up all work assigned by teachers as make-up work for the instructional time that has been missed.
- Check out of school at the office if leaving school during the school day.

I would strongly encourage parents and/or guardians to view our attendance policies in our Student/Parent Handbook. All high school students have a copy of the handbook on their school iPad. If you have any questions please contact me at school and I will help you in any way I can.

# MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS <br> BY RICH BACON 

Parent-Teacher Conferences were held on September 22 and September 24 after 6 weeks of school. Thank you to all parents who took the time and effort to come to conferences and meet with their child's teachers. One of the most important factors in determining student academic success is parent involvement. I encourage all parents to make time to help establish good study habits and talk to their children about their academic progress on a regular basis. One of the benefits to having conferences this early in the year is it allows parents to meet with teachers before the end of the first quarter so any problems can be addressed and positive behaviors can be reinforced. The $1^{\text {st }}$ Quarter ends on October 14, so there are still three weeks left in the quarter for students to finish the quarter strong. As always, if you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact your child's teachers.

During the first 2 weeks of school all students in grades 4-8 were administered the Measures of Academic Progress or MAP test. These are computerized adaptive tests that provide teachers information that can be used to improve teaching and learning. Results from these tests provide achievement and growth data for each grade level and individual student that will allow our teachers to develop targeted instructional strategies to improve student learning. Students took tests in the subject areas of Reading, Language Usage, Math, and Science. Teachers can use MAP growth data to pinpoint the instructional areas our students are ready to tackle-whether they are on, above or below grade level and can use this data to differentiate instruction and pinpoint individual student needs. Information from these assessments can be used to identify areas of strengths and weaknesses for each individual student and also provide our staff with information on where our curriculum may need some improvement.

The $7^{\text {th }} \& 8^{\text {th }}$ grade Band marched at the Richardson County Fair in Humboldt on September $16^{\text {th }}$ and have been performing in the Pep Band at our home football and volleyball games. The band, which includes over 40 students, was an impressive site as they marched in unison playing the Johnson County Central Fight Song.

Middle school athletics is in full swing as we are in the last half of the fall sports season. We have excellent participation this fall with 29 boys playing football, 25 girls playing volleyball and 8 boys and 4 girls running cross country during the fall season. The Junior High Football Team is currently 3-0 with 3 games left to play. The Junior High Volleyball Team has been very competitive and is improving by the day and our Junior High Cross Country runners are competing at a high level with several runners bringing home medals from various meets. These student-athletes are working hard to improve their fundamentals and come together as a team, and are committing a great deal of time and effort to participate. There are still a few opportunities to watch our athletes participate this fall.

# Notes from the High School Counselor Mrs. Olivia Reuter 

## Seniors Can Start Filling Out Their 2022-2023 FAFSA on October $1^{\text {st }}$

Seniors who plan to attend college starting in the fall of 2022 can start applying for federal financial aid by filling out a FAFSA (free application for federal student aid) starting on October 1, 2021 at fasa.gov. Make sure that you go to the fafsa.gov address. Do not search for the FAFSA on a search engine, it could take you to the wrong page. There are copycat pages out there that look like the FAFSA page, but at the end they ask for money in order to submit it. The FAFSA is free to apply for, never pay money to submit a FAFSA form! It is very important that they fill out a 2022-2023 form and not a 2021-2022 form. You fill out the form for the year you will be in college. Before you can fill out the FAFSA, both the student and one parent need an FSA ID. To get FSA IDs, go to https://studentaid.gov/fsa-id/create-account/launch; after you have these, you can start the FAFSA. Parents who have FSA IDs from children who have already been in college, can use that same FSA ID. If you need help with the FAFSA, EducationQuest is glad to help. They offer virtual appointments and can also help by phone. To get help with your FAFSA or set up a virtual appointment, call the Lincoln office of EducationQuest at (402) 475-5222 or the Omaha office at (402) 391-4033. ## Start Applying for the Susan Buffett Scholarship on November $1^{\text {st }}$

The Susan T. Buffett Foundation has offered scholarships to college students in Nebraska for over 50 years. Scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis to first-time freshman entering college who live in Nebraska, graduate from a Nebraska high school with plans to attend a Nebraska public college, and demonstrate financial need. To be eligible for this scholarship you must Live in Nebraska and meet in-state residency requirements of the college you plan to attend, graduate from a Nebraska High School, achieve at least a 2.0 cumulative unweighted GPA in high school, have an EFC on your FAFSA below $\$ 10,000$ be a first time freshman entering college, and plan to attend a Nebraska public community college, state college or university.

Important notes- students obtaining dual enrollment credits in high school are still eligible to apply, DACA, undocumented, or DACA eligible students are still eligible to apply, and you do not need to be Pell Grant eligible to qualify. To apply for the Susan Buffett scholarship, go to https://buffettscholarships.org/eligibility-selection. The application opens November 1, 2021 and deadline to apply is February 1, 2022 at 5:00 PM. It's important to start this application early because there are several sections to complete. Students must have all sections of their application done by the deadline date and time. The Susan Buffett committee does not accept any late applications, there are no exceptions.

## School Bus Stop Arms

Nebraska State Statute 60-6, 175 states: "(1) Upon meeting or overtaking, from the front or rear, any school bus on which the yellow warning signal lights are flashing, the driver of a motor vehicle shall reduce the speed of such vehicle to not more than twenty-five miles per hour, shall bring such vehicle to a complete stop when the school bus is stopped, the stop signal arm is extended, and the flashing red signal lights are turned on, and shall remain stopped until the flashing red signal lights are turned off, the stop signal arm is
 retracted, and the school bus resumes motion."

Please, when you see a school bus (from anywhere) with the stop arm extended and red lights flashing, STOP. Help keep our children safe.
