

Bond Language & Preliminary School Designs

On February 9, at Johnson County Central's Regular School Board Meeting, a resolution to file for a school bond election was passed. The bond was then filed with the Johnson County Clerk's Office on February 15 and will appear on the ballot of the May 10, 2022 Primary Election. The bond will read as follows:

"Shall Johnson County School District 0050 (Johnson County Central Public Schools) in the State of Nebraska issue its general obligation bonds in an aggregate stated principal amount not to exceed Fortythree Million Three Hundred Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$43,375,000), for the purpose of paying costs of land acquisition and the construction and acquisition of pre-kindergarten to 12th grade facilities for the District; and providing for the necessary furniture, equipment and apparatus for such facilities; such bonds to be issued from time to time, to bear interest at such rate or rates, to be sold at such prices and to become due at such time or times as may be fixed by, or determined at the direction of, the Board of Education; and

"Shall the District cause to be levied and collected annually a special levy of taxes against all the taxable property in the District sufficient in rate and amount to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due?"

Electors voting in favor of such proposition shall blacken the oval opposite the words "FOR such Bonds and tax" following such proposition, and electors voting against such proposition shall blacken the oval opposite the words "AGAINST such Bonds and tax" following such proposition.


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

State Aid of a Different Kind

Although it is true that the Johnson County Central School District does not currently receive much state aid (\$57,595 or less than 1% of the general fund budget), there are other state sources from which JCC derives funds. These include:

- Special Education (School Age) This is a percentage of actual costs to educate in special education. JCC is currently reimbursed 43% of actual SPED costs; this reimbursement varies from year to year. Overall, this number has steadily declined over the years.
- Special Education Transportation (School Age) State reimbursement based on actual costs to transport special education students. JCC is currently reimbursed 49% of actual SPED costs.
- Homestead Exemption State reimbursement to the district for landowners with this exemption.
- Property Tax Credit State reimbursement for property owners receiving tax credits through LB1107.
- Personal Property Tax Credit 2021 was the last year for this. This pertains to items such as farm machinery or business property that owners pay personal property tax on.
- Pro-Rate Motor Vehicle Taxes on fleet vehicles dispersed to political subdivisions.
- State Apportionment Based on the annual census of school-aged children.
- Payments for High Ability Learners Categorical program that schools apply for.
- Other State Receipts

Overall, JCC received \$1,126,755 from state sources for the 2020-2021 school year.

The Homestead Exemption is a property tax exemption program that homeowners should be aware of. The definition of a "homestead" is as follows:

"A homestead is the residence or mobile home, and up to one acre of land surrounding it, actually occupied by a person who is the owner of record or the surviving spouse of the owner of record from January 1 through August 15 in each year."

The exemption applies to the following 6 categories:

Persons over age 65.

- Veterans totally disabled by a nonservice-connected accident or illness.
- Qualified disabled individuals.
- Qualified totally disabled veterans and their surviving spouses.
- Veterans whose home was substantially contributed to by the Department of Veterans Affairs (DVA) and their surviving spouses.
- Individuals who have a developmental disability.

Another is The Refundable Income Tax Credit for School District Property Taxes.

"Don't Forget to Claim the Property Tax Credit...

Don't forget to claim the refundable income tax credit for property taxes paid to schools on 2021 income tax filings. The tax credit, created with passage of LB 1107 in 2020, equals 25.3 percent of property taxes paid to schools in 2021. It applies to property taxes paid on real property (land, buildings, residences) excluding taxes levied for bond repayments or taxes levied as a result of voter-approved levy limit overrides. Nebraska Farm Bureau estimates the credit, when combined with the Tier 1 property tax credit program, provides an average property tax reduction of \$6,319 per farm or ranch, roughly 23 percent of average property taxes paid in 2021.

The arrival of spring also means the start of state assessment time. The window for this year's Nebraska Student Centered Assessment System (NSCAS) Summative assessments will open in late March and run through the end of April. Eighth graders started the testing cycle on January 23rd with the NeSA-Writing Assessment. More information will be communicated as we get closer to our testing dates. As a reminder there are some test-taking strategies and routines that students and parents can utilize to help their children be successful on any future assessments:

- Make sure your child gets a good night's sleep and eats a good breakfast the morning of the tests.
- Have your child dress in layers studies show children do better on assessments if they don't have to think about how hot or cold they are.
- Encourage your child to practice the following test-taking strategies: Skip a question and move on if you don't know the answer you can always come back to that question later; Check your answers carefully; Encourage your child to read on the days leading up to the test. The easiest and best way to prepare your child to do well on tests is to have them read often.
- Encourage your child to take the tests seriously. A lot of important decisions regarding your children are made based on data we receive from these tests. If students don't give their best effort on the standardized tests much our data will be invalid, making it difficult to make decisions that will be in the bests interests of our students.



Spring Season in the Band Department

The Spring semester is quickly gaining speed as we roll into contest season and end of the year concerts. The band students have several events coming up by the end of March and from then on, the light at the end of the tunnel is fast approaching. Below, you can find the list of music dates we have left in the school year.

Meridian Honor Choir/Band





March Testing and College Visits

On March 22nd, all JCC juniors and students in their third year of high school will take the state mandated ACT test free of charge. Students do not need to sign up on their own for this test, they are already signed up through our school. Student scores can be used for colleges, scholarships, or whatever they need an ACT score for. It's nice to get the opportunity to take the test free of charge instead of having to pay \$63.00 to take it. All sophomores will take the pre-ACT free of charge that same day. This test is a shorter version of the ACT that gives students their predicted ACT range and shows them what to improve on to do better on the ACT, when they take that test. There will be a parent letter coming out on testing that includes more details. While sophomores and juniors are testing, the freshmen and seniors will be going on college visits to either Peru State College, SCC-Beatrice, Highland Community College, Doane University, or Bryan College of Health Sciences. All students will receive free breakfast that morning. The students on college visits will receive free lunch, and the students testing will have the option of a sack lunch from the kitchen after testing. Students will be released from school after testing is done or after they get back from their college visits.

The FAFSA Application for 2022-2023 College Students Is Still Open

High school seniors and students already in college should apply for federal financial aid by filling out a FAFSA (free application for federal student aid) online at fasa.gov. Make sure that you go to the fafsa.gov address. Do not search for the FAFSA on a search engine, it could take you to the wrong page. There are copycat pages out there that look like the FAFSA page, but at the end they ask for money in order to submit it. The FAFSA is free to apply for, never pay money to submit a FAFSA form! It is very important that they fill out a 2022-2023 form and not a 2021-2022 form. You fill out the form for the year you will be in college. Before you can fill out the FAFSA, both the student and one parent need an FSA ID. To get FSA IDs, go to https://studentaid.gov/fsa-id/create-account/launch; after you have these, you can start the FAFSA. Parents who have FSA IDs from children who have already been in college, can use that same FSA ID. If you need help with the FAFSA, EducationQuest is glad to help. They offer virtual appointments and can also help by phone. To get help with your FAFSA or set up a virtual appointment, call the Lincoln office of EducationQuest at (402) 475-5222 or the Omaha office at (402) 391-4033. Apply to Take the June ACT Now

Students can apply online to take the ACT in June at https://my.act.org/. Register by May 6th to take the June 11, 2022 ACT. If a student is on an IEP and needs accommodations, they need to request these online. Students who qualify for free or reduced lunch can ask Mrs. Reuter for a fee waiver form to take the ACT test for free. Keep in mind that all juniors will take the ACT for free in March for their Nebraska state testing.



NSCAS Growth: Multiple Measures to Help Students Learn

The Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System (NSCAS), pronounced "en-skass," is a statewide assessment system that embodies Nebraska's holistic view of students and helps them prepare for success in postsecondary education, career, and civic life. It uses multiple measures throughout the year to provide educators and decision makers at all levels with the insights they need to support student learning.

The Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System (NSCAS) was developed to support the connection between curriculum, instruction, and assessment by the Nebraska Department of Education (NDE) with the assistance of Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA), the creator of Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) assessment . It includes formative, interim, and summative (proficiency) measures, with the recognition that educators need different types of data to inform teaching and learning. Nebraska districts will fully transition to an adaptive, through-year assessment model for grades 3–8 in English language arts and mathematics in the 2022-23 school year. NSCAS through-year assessment combines the best of MAP Growth and the NSCAS General Summative test to reduce overall testing and provide better data during the year to support learning. Students in these grades will no longer participate in MAPS, only NSCAS Growth. The NSCAS adaptive through-year model produces growth and summative scores.

The NSCAS adaptive through-year model is like a hybrid of the current NSCAS General Summative and NSCAS Interim (MAP Growth). Fall, winter, and spring tests will adapt outside of grade level to reflect student learning level and growth. The assessments will also measure student performance relative to the NSCAS General Summative, providing grade-level performance information throughout the school year for instructional purposes. Information from the fall, winter, and spring assessments will culminate in summative proficiency scores at year's end. This unified approach will increase testing efficiency while providing access to normative and criterion-based information throughout the year to support teaching and learning.

NSCAS Growth is aligned to the NDE State Standards. This school year, JCC students participated in NSCAS Growth testing in the winter (pilot assessment) and will participate in NSCAS Growth testing this spring. Students in grades 3-8 will participate in NSCAS Growth, which will provide more detailed information about students strengths and areas for growth through the school year. Students are assessed in English Language Arts (ELA) & Mathematics in grades 3-8 and Science in grades 5 & 8. The NSCAS General Summative Assessment measures student performance against Nebraska content area standards, showing how learning compares to expectations. The assessments are computeradaptive. Staff will be able to use data from prior MAPS assessments to instruct and assist students, as it will correlate with the new NSCAS Growth student data.
