## The Building Construction Bond

JCC's school board and administration continues to meet with Clark-Enersen Partners (architecture firm) and Boyd Jones (construction manager at-risk) to explore building methods, building materials, and alternate building plans. The goal remains the same: to get all JCC students to one site, under one roof, in an affordable manner in facilities that are functional, durable, and attractive providing all the necessary spaces to continue to provide the same variety of programming as well as providing opportunities for future expansion.

As of late, we have been exploring the various options of using the topography of the proposed property to the north of the current football field. As it is not entirely flat, we are discussing whether or not to "toe into" the landscape or if the natural decline in elevation can be used to our advantage. The latest iterations of the plans have a moderate reduction in size of some classrooms and rooms with fewer or no windows. The current goal is to keep the total square footage at around 112,000 square feet and cost between \$43-45 million.

Should the team develop plans that will meet the needs and parameters of the district, patrons can expect a mail-in bond election in late May or June

## Results of the 4-Day Week Survey

In late November and early December, staff and stakeholders were asked to complete a survey regarding their thoughts about a potential 4 -day school week. The idea of the 4-day school week has been discussed by our school board, staff, and some patrons over the last four years. Initially, it was seen as a potential cost savings to the district. And, according to our figures in JCC's business office, the district could save approximately $\$ 4,000 /$ day. This would be in the areas of transportation, utilities and personnel.

Not only does there seem to be a workforce shortage, but there is also a teacher shortage nationwide. Colleges and universities are not graduating as many educators as in past years. When a teaching job was posted, it was not uncommon to get 20 to 30 applicants. Now, schools are receiving fewer than 10 and in some instances are not getting any applicants. Special Education, Industrial Technology (formerly referred to as "shop"), Science and Music positions have been particularly hard to fill. Some school districts who were not able to fill positions used substitute teachers to fill positions for an entire year.



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Looking closely at JCC's current staffing, we have discussed the number of staff who are eligible to retire in the next five years (up to 14 teachers, 2 administrators, and 14 support staff) and those who are eligible to retire in the next six to ten years ( 8 teachers, 1 administrator). The questions arose: Would a 4 -day week be a way to attract and retain new teachers? However, we know that a 4-day week will have an impact on all our stakeholders.

Therefore, the survey was created and distributed to staff and patrons. The results are displayed below. The results of the survey showed that $\mathbf{8 1 . 2 \%}$ of current JCC staff are in favor of a 4 -day school week. Out of 207 community responses, $\mathbf{7 2 . 9 \%}$ are in favor of a 4-day school week. Comments from the surveys were consistent with the following positives and concerns:

Positives of a 4-day week:

- More family time.
- More time for students to decompress and get school work done.
- More opportunities for students to work.
- Less time for students riding school buses or school transportation.
- Cost savings to the district.
- More time for appointments without having to miss school (improved attendance).
- Attractive to potential future teacher hires.

Concerns of a 4-day week:

- Welfare of our students.
- Daycare.
- Student learning impact.
- Loss in wages to support staff.

Although the pros may have outnumbered the cons, the severity of the cons are such that they are worth thoughtful consideration. We will be exploring ways in which these concerns can be addressed prior to implementing a 4-day school week. As a result, we will plan to continue with our "hybrid" schedule for the 2023-2024 school year.

Thank you to all of those who took the time to complete the survey and give constructive feedback!

## Proposed 2023-2024 School Calendar

As stated above, we plan to continue with the "hybrid" calendar format. Some elements of this format:

- No planned early outs other than the first and last days of the school year.
- All staff development days are on Mondays except the ESU4 Engaging Educators Conference in February.
- Parent-Teacher Conferences are on Mondays.
- August 18 and 21 are no school days for students.
$\checkmark$ This allows for participation in the Johnson County Fair.
$\diamond$ The Otoe and Pawnee County Fairs are in July.
$\diamond$ The Nemaha County Fair on August 13-16 could be a conflict for a small number of our students.

Some things to remember when creating the calendar:

- Instructional Hours (the hours of the school day excluding lunch).
$\diamond$ Middle School/High School = minimum of 1,080 instructional hours.
$\diamond$ Elementary $=$ minimum of 1,032 instructional hours.
$\diamond$ Kindergarten $=$ minimum of 400 instructional hours (includes lunch).
$\checkmark$ Preschool = minimum of 450 instructional hours (includes lunch).
- Teacher Contracted Days
$\diamond$ Currently 185 days (this includes days with students and professional growth days).

Changes from the 22-23 calendar to the 23-24 calendar:

- The Christmas break starts later and goes farther into January.
$\checkmark$ This puts the school more in line with the NSAA Activities Moratorium.

Now is an excellent time to sit down with each of your children and take a close look at their academic progress. The semester grades a student earns are one of the determining factors whether an individual will be promoted to the next grade level or be retained in their current grade next year. Generally, we expect Middle School students to pass seven out of the ten semesters of core subjects (math, social studies, science, reading \& language arts) in a given year to be promoted to the next grade. Any student passing six semesters or less will be considered for retention. An administrative committee will consider each case on an individual basis." The administrative committee will look at other factors such as the student's MAP scores, NSCAS scores, personal history and social maturity. If, after looking at the other factors, the committee believes the student can be successful at the next grade level it may recommend the student be promoted. Or, the committee may feel that the student may lack the basic skills and would benefit from another year of maturity and recommend they be retained in their current grade. Regardless of your child's grades, it would be very beneficial for parents and children to sit down and discuss how they did during the first semester and set some academic goals for the $2^{\text {nd }}$ semester.

On a related note, second semester Parent-Teacher Conferences will take place on Monday, February $13^{\text {th }}$ from 11:00 to 7:00 p.m. Parent-Teacher Conferences is an ideal time for parents and teachers to have detailed conversations about child's current grades, the effort that is being given by their child, the student's classroom behavior and other issues that are relevant to student learning. ParentTeacher Conferences also provides your child's teachers with an opportunity to share classroom work or share something positive that your child has done. The dialogue generated at Parent-Teacher Conferences is an important element in a student's learning process that is beneficial to all and I hope all parents will take advantage of this opportunity. We hope to see you on February $13^{\text {th }}$.

## NEWS FROM PRINCIPAL RICK LESTER

The month of February is our first step in preparation for next fall where our students will start pre-registration for the 2023-2024 school year.

What is pre-registration? The students choose their top eight classes and two options - at this time there is no set schedule. Once all pre-registrations are complete we'll plan the class schedule. Every student must sign their preregistration form and their parent must also sign the form. This gives the parents the opportunity to see their student's class selections and "sign off" on it. Mrs. Reuter, the school counselor, is the final signature on every student's pre-registration form. She reviews each student's class selection to verify they are taking appropriate classes which are required for each grade and are meeting their graduation requirements.

Students will receive their pre-registration forms on Wednesday, February 8, 2023. They will be due back to the office on Wednesday, March 8, 2023. This due date is necessary so that we can plan the class schedule. We try to create a schedule that accommodates the most students with the least amount of conflicts. Once we have the best class schedule created, Mrs. Reuter will personally meet with each student who has a class conflict. A student will only have a class schedule conflict if they are unable to get an eight period class schedule by using their eight selected classes or two options. Mrs. Reuter will than aid them in selecting an additional alternate class until we are able to fill their eight periods with an appropriate schedule.

After we have completed a successful class schedule, I will send out summer pre-registration letters to all students. Around the first week in August, each student will receive this letter which will contain their actual class schedule, complete with periods and teachers for every class. If the students and parents are satisfied with this schedule, nothing more needs to be done before the beginning of school next fall. If students desire to make changes to their class schedule they will have a scheduled day (to be announced), to meet with the counselor to make changes prior to the start of school. Students will also have the first five days of the 2023-2024 school year to change their class schedule.

I encourage all parents to work with your student to help them plan their 20232024 class schedule - your input and encouragement is essential.

Johnson County Central Foundation Scholarship Applications- Due March $16{ }^{\text {th }}$

The Johnson County Central Foundation is offering nine scholarships to JCC seniors this year. To apply, seniors must fill out the application that was emailed to them. Seniors will need to follow the instructions on the application and also have two references, one from someone in the school, and one from someone outside the school (an employer, community member, church pastor, etc.) There will be three $\$ 2000$ four year college/university scholarships awarded, three $\$ 1000$ two-year college scholarships available, and three $\$ 1000$ trade school scholarships awarded. All scholarship applications must be given to Mrs. Reuter by March $16^{\text {th }}$.

## Southeast Community College Scholarship Applications Open Until March $1^{\text {st }}$

The Southeast Community College (SCC) online scholarship application for high school seniors planning to attend SCC for the Fall 2023 semester opened on December 1, 2022. The application will be open until March 1, 2022. In order to apply, students will need the following information: 1) a valid and functional e-mail address, 2) their mailing address, 3) their social security number, and 4) their phone number. ## Juniors: Apply for Boys' State, Girls' State, and Junior Law Cadet ASAP

If any junior boys or girls are interested in attending Boys' or Girls' State on the campus of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln from June 4-10, they need to talk to Mrs. Reuter as soon as possible to apply. This is an excellent leadership opportunity where students use and improve their leadership skills and make life-long connections with other students their age. They also get to meet the governor of Nebraska, state legislators, UNL professors and athletic coaches, and hear from several motivational speakers. Junior boys and girls are also welcome to apply to attend the Junior Law Cadet program that will be held June 20-21 (boys) and June 22-23 (girls). This program allows juniors to explore and experience the various aspects of law enforcement such as law enforcement technology, tactical medicine, K-9 handling, firearms training, drones, aviation support, and emergency vehicle operations. This experience will be held at the Nebraska State Patrol Training Academy in Grand Island.

## 2023-2024 FAFSA Application Open

Seniors in high school who plan to attend college should complete a FAFSA form online. Seniors can now start applying for the FAFSA and should definitely have this done by March 15, 2023. The earlier they are completed, the better. Some colleges and universities only have so much grant and scholarship money to award and when it's gone, it's gone. To create a FAFSA, seniors will need their own and their parents' 2021 tax information and W2s. They need to fill out the 2023-2024 FAFSA because the FAFSA is for the year you will start college. One parent and one student will need an FSA ID. If a parent already has one from an older child in college, they can use the same one. ## JCC Preschool Enrollment for the 2023-24 School Year Opens February 1, 2023

We know you are your child's first and most important teacher, and we would love to join you in the education of your young learner.

Our focus is to provide learning opportunities for those students who will be entering kindergarten the following year. Therefore, the majority of our enrollment will be filled by prekindergarten students. Prekindergarten is defined as a child who will be four years of age on or before July 31, 2023. A three-year-old is defined as a child who will be three years of age on or before July 31, 2023. We offer a full-day program for prekindergarten students in Tecumseh and Cook. Three-year-olds will join the morning portion of the full-day program. Preschool is in session Tuesday through Friday. It is preferred that your child be fully toilet trained before entering the program.

The preschool schedule encompasses discovery through active involvement. "The Creative Curriculum" program is implemented. Activities, materials, and equipment reflect and respect the diversity of race and multiculturalism and the physical and mental abilities of all children.

There is no tuition fee for preschool. However, breakfast and/or lunch fees will be charged when applicable. An application for free and reduced meals will be offered at orientation.

Transportation will be provided between sites as well as to and from licensed child care providers within close geographic proximity of the attending site at no cost.

Enrollment will be filled according to the following criteria: Rule 11 guidelines, students currently enrolled in our program, and the date an application is received. If interested in the preschool program, please complete the electronic application which will be available beginning February 1, 2023 on the school website: www.jccentral.org. If you would prefer a paper application, please contact the elementary office.

## Mapping Our Food - First Grade - Mrs. Faris

Through a grant from the National Agriculture in the Classroom and the Nebraska Agriculture in the Classroom, the First Grade students in Mrs. Faris's class received funds to learn about where foods come from in Nebraska. The Agriculture in the Classroom program is managed by the Farm Bureau Foundation. Other organizations that supported this grant are The Nebraska Beef Council, Nebraska Corn Board, and Kimmel Orchard \& Vineyard, Midwest Dairy, and Nebraska Dry Bean Commission. It is also supported by the United States Department of Agriculture.
This grant was used to learn about our food system. The focus was on Nebraska-grown products from across the state. Students learned about the people who produce these foods and also read letters from children their age who have a family that provides these foods for us. We received a map of Nebraska. On this map we placed stickers on the certain area that we were discussing. We were also given posters highlighting these different foods, how they are produced and get to our grocery stores, farmers markets, or in orchards for us to buy. We tasted each food and completed a chart telling what it looked like, smelled like, and if we like it or not.

We were learning about the harvest season and Thanksgiving at this time so we added a few foods to taste. We sampled cornbread, pumpkin pie, and cranberry sauce and discussed what those foods are made of and that they are traditional foods for some families.


We tasted apples, applesauce, apple juice, and apple pie. We tasted bacon and discussed the other foods we get from pork. We scrambled eggs to taste and discussed how we use those in many ways. We discussed how wheat is made into flour and used in many of our foods. Dry beans was another food to try. We used the dry beans to sort and identify and We took beans from cans to try, but they weren't our favorite. Hamburger was a favorite of the class. We ate tiny
 hamburgers on tiny buns (so that they were linked back to the flour). We knew that honey comes from bees, but were very interested in learning how it is harvested. For our milk foods, we tried white milk, yogurt, cheese (on our hamburgers), whip cream, and ice cream. Ice cream was hands-down the most favorite of the foods tasted. It was fun learning all the steps it takes to get milk and milk products to our stores. Popcorn is a tasty treat that we didn't know much about. We learned there are popcorn farms and Nebraska grows more popcorn than any other state. Our last tasting was potato chips. We learned that Frito Lay makes over 56 different flavors of potato chips. We tried sour cream and onion, barbeque, and regular. Did you know that it takes only 4 or 5 potatoes to make a bag of chips?

This was a fantastic learning experience. Our goal was to learn about how foods come to us in many different ways and the steps it takes to get those foods to our stores and to our tables. It was a delicious way to learn about the importance of agriculture in our state.

Many thanks for our food producers around our area and throughout our state. We appreciate all of the wonderful foods we have!! And a Special Thank You to The National and

## Weather School

The First Grade classes had the opportunity to have Jennifer Clason from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration from Valley, Nebraska, teach us about the different kinds of weather we experience here.

She brought several things with her. The students got to hold an example of the latex balloon that they send up everyday to help meteorologists make forecasts and predict storms. She also had a sensor that goes with the balloon that tells the air pressure and temperature. She explained that the weather forecasts we see on t.v. are based on the information they get from the balloons. She also brought casts of huge hailstones. The students loved passing those around. Some were bigger than their hands. She showed them an experiment on how to make a cloud with shaving cream and then watch how the precipitation falls. She also brought the equipment to show a tornado within a clear box.

The students also thoroughly enjoyed a video showing tornados, strong winds, hail, and rain. We watched it twice! It was a very informative hour and our presenter was terrific! Thank you to Mrs. Reuter for setting this event up for us! Now we are very interested in weather and may have a future meteorologist or two in our classrooms!
