SUPERINTENDENT NOTES by Jack D. Moles

Spring is the time when students, and hopefully their parents, begin to make plans for the next school year. Of particular note, students are working with the Principals and Counselors to schedule classes for the ensuing year. I would like to take a little time to stress an important area for students who will be in grades 5-12 next year: instrumental music. Band involves an investment in money, time, and effort, but the benefits far outweigh what is put into this undertaking. Educational research abounds that shows the benefits of student involvement in arts education, especially in instrumental music. Examples of these benefits would include the following:

- 1. Surveys show that secondary students who participate in band report the lowest lifetime and current use of all substances, including alcohol, tobacco, and illegal drugs. There are always individual exceptions to survey results, but the national trend is that students who are involved in band are less likely to resort to these activities.
- 2. The College Board, a nationally recognized non-profit organization that works help students attain success in college and administers the SAT college entrance exams, identifies the arts, especially music, as one of the six basic academic are as that students should study in order to be successful in college. They go on to say that students who have had classes in music performance score higher on the SAT than students who do not participate in music performance classes. Similar studies show the same correlations with the ACT college entrance examinations. Higher ACT and SAT scores result in more scholarship money, sometimes thou sands of dollars. This alone should be an enticement to be involved in instru mental music.
- 3. National studies show that music participants receive more academic honors than non-music students. I know this first-hand. For several years I have served as co-chair of the Nebraska Rural Community Schools Association's Scholar ship and Recognition Committee. This committee chooses NRCSA's scholar ship recipients. As we review student applicants each year I know several committee members will look not just for academic and athletic achievement from the candidates, but also for their involvement in the arts, especially music. Students who either are not involved in music or drop out of music early in high school often do not receive the same considerations as those who remain in music throughout high school. I am certain this takes place in other scholarship considerations as well. Again, the financial benefits of being involved in band cannot be overlooked.

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- 4. There are numerous studies that prove that involvement in instrumental music is especially beneficial to developing strong math students. Many of these studies show enhanced abstract reasoning skills which are necessary for learning math and science. Similar studies also show an increase in reading competencies and learning foreign languages. Going back to the ACT and SAT, increased abilities in math and reading will result in higher test scores.
- 5. According to the National Data Resource Center, students who can be classified as "disruptive" (i.e. frequently truant or disciplinary problems) tend to be students who are not involved in music classes. Again, there are always individual exceptions to surveys, but the statistical trends point out students who are in band tend to be better behaved.

These are just a few research-based reasons why I would encourage all students to be involved in music, especially in instrumental music. I would add in a few more benefits from my own observations:

- 1. Our students who are involved in instrumental music tend to be our most positive student leaders. They are able to influence other students in a positive manner and encourage cooperation.
- 2. Our band members happen to be a very large source of community and school pride. I have received numerous notes and visits of appreciation for what these kids "bring to the table". They are simply looked upon with respect and pride.
- 3. The work that our band puts into becoming better has definitely been hard, but it has paid huge dividends. The kids benefit the most as they see programs come together through their hard work. They definitely learn social skills that are not always learned by all students.
- 4. Our band program needs more involvement if we truly want to meet the goal of having the best band in southeast Nebraska. This is an attainable goal that I have for our program. It can only be achieved through hard work and dedication of all involved with the program, but increased numbers of participants would not hurt these efforts at all.

As band students get older I sometimes see them drop by the wayside. This always concerns me as I believe these students are giving away a part of their life they will never get back. I know I look back at my own career as a band student and am always thankful that my mother did not allow me to drop out of band. I know I am better for the experience. As parents, my wife and I have also had the same expectations for our own kids.

Often parents will cite the reason for letting their child drop something as not wanting to force their child to do something they don't want to do. I guess I look at it as having an expectation that they will do something for their own good. The little research that I have cited will show the benefits. If nothing else, the monetary benefits should make it worthwhile. I would encourage all parents to look closer at the benefits of having their child(ren) involved in the band program.

NEWS FROM PRINCIPAL RICK LESTER

Spring has sprung! We've had a few really nice days and I'm sure the students are looking forward to the end of the school year. However, we've got some important topics to cover before we finish up the 2014-2015 school year.

The first major item is the State NeSA testing for all 11th grade students. These tests are very important, not only for our school district, but the results also help our students understand their academic strengths and weaknesses. Our district uses the results of these tests to improve our instructional practices so we can enhance our students' academic successes and better instruct them where they need improvement. These NeSA tests will take place beginning Tuesday, March 31 with the NeSA Reading. NeSA Math is on Wednesday, April 1, and NeSA Science test will be given Wednesday, April 15. It is imperative that all 11th grade students are in attendance on these three days for the NeSA tests. I encourage you to stress the importance to your student to take these Sate NeSA tests in a serious manner. Our teachers will not be issuing homework for the students taking these tests so that they may concentrate on doing their best work when taking the NeSA tests. Please also encourage them to eat well and get plenty of rest before the testing days so they are physically and mentally alert during the testing days.

The next important activity at JCC I would like to discuss is Prom. Prom is scheduled for Saturday, April 18. Doors will open at 8:00 p.m. parents will be allowed to enter the building for viewing and photos from 8:00 p.m. to 8:45 p.m. The dance will be held from 8:45 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. Hors d'oeuvres will be served.

Prom participants who will be attending post-prom activities will be allowed to change into other clothing at the school. They will need to bring this change of clothes to the school with them when they come to prom. The post-prom participants will be transported visa busses, provided by JCC, to Sempecks Bowling and Entertainment in Elkhorn. The busses will depart at approximately 12:00 a.m. and the students will return to JCC at approximately 6:00 a.m.

To help insure that we have a safe and drug and alcohol free prom and post-prom, the Johnson County Sheriff's department will be administering breathalyzer test before prom and before the students enter the buses for post-prom activities.

The final important event I want to discuss now is our JCC Honors Day, which will be held Monday, April 27th at 1:00 p.m. in the high school gym. This program recognizes our student's academic successes. All students will be present at this assembly and will be honored for their achievements in the presence of their peers. We invite and encourage all parents to attend this assembly. We understand this is during the work day, but we hope parents will still attempt to be present as their students are being honored. There will be many awards given during this assembly: Honor roll, classroom awards, military awards and many others. Please come and help recognize these award recipients.



Students will be taking a number of Nebraska State Accountability (NeSA) tests through the month of April. These assessments are very important for our students and the district. Results from these assessments provide data which help guide curriculum decisions for our district. Results from these assessments will also be used to help determine a student's academic placement for the next school year. As the testing dates approach there are some test-taking strategies and some things parents can do to help their children be successful on these assessments:

- Make sure your child gets a good night's sleep the night before each test and eats a good breakfast the morning of the tests.
- Have your child dress in layers studies show children do better on assessments if they don't have to think about how hot or cold they are.
- Encourage your child to practice the following test-taking strategies: Skip a question and move on if you don't know the answer you can always come back to that question later; Check your answers carefully; Make sure the numbers of your answers correspond to the numbers of the questions on the test; Encourage your child to read on the days leading up to the test. The easiest and best way to prepare your child to do well on tests is to have them read often.

- Encourage your child to take the tests seriously. A lot of important decisions regarding your children are made based on data we receive from these tests. If students don't give their best effort on the standardized tests much of our data will be invalid, making it difficult to make decisions that will be in the best interests of our students.
- Keep a good attitude. Think positively!

NeSA—The Glass Half Full!

The end of the month of March brings on NeSA testing season. Students in grades 3 through 8, and grade 11, will be assessed on their knowledge of the Nebraska State Standards in the areas of Reading, Math and Science. Like it or not, these assessments are required by state law and they do matter.

These assessments are a result of federal mandates that require each state to have educational standards and a way to assess them. The unique thing about Nebraska is that we created our own standards and our own assessments. (Not every state does this, i.e. Common Core)

As these assessments approach, we can look at it several ways.

- We can look at it as someone doing something to us and we are the victim here. (I do not recommend this approach.)
- We have too much testing to do, so let's just quick get it over with. (Also not recommended).

This is an opportunity for our children to compete and shine!

Attitude will always have a direct impact on outcome. don't care what it is we're doing, our attitudes can make or break us. It's the difference between cheering for someone who is competing at their highest level (win or lose), or feeling almost sick as you watch someone who has given up or doesn't care.

NeSA testing should be no different. I could not be prouder of our students when they sit down to an assessment, NeSA or otherwise, and put their full efforts into it. Not only do the students perform better, but they

feel better afterwards.

I encourage you to encourage your child. Take a look at last year's efforts by your child and set some goals with them. Third graders will not have previous scores, but you can still set a goal for your child to work their hardest and give their best effort.



This busy, two day festival allowed the students to rehearse, watch the Doane choirs in concert, attend a dance, and present a final concert.

Kaycee Bartels, Courtney Klaasmeyer, & Grant Moles participated in the BOCH (Bands, Orchestra, and Choruses at the Holland) Honor Festival on January 23rd – 25th on the campus of UNO. Following rehearsals on Friday and Saturday at the Strauss Performing Arts Center, there was a 1:15 PM concert on Sunday, January 25th, at the Holland Center for Performing Arts in downtown Omaha.

The Nebraska Choral Directors Association sponsored the bi-annual Singing Youth of Nebraska Festivals throughout the state in January and February. JCC attended this 7-9th grade festival on Saturday, January 24 in Beatrice at the Hevelone Center for Performing Arts. There were 127 students from Beatrice, Crete, Fairbury, Johnson County Central, Lincoln Southeast, Meridian, Nebraska City, Omaha Burke, Pawnee City, Syracuse, Tri-County, and Wilber-Clatonia. Our clinician was Nate Helzer from Omaha Burke High School accompanied by Victory Sedlacek.

Monday, March 9, JCC hosted the 22nd annual Freshmore Clinic. This is a clinic Mr. Doran started in 1994 to help strengthen the younger voices (Freshmen and Sophomores) from area schools. We rehearsed all day in the Elementary Auditorium and presented a 6:30 PM concert that evening. This year's clinician was Kevin Beseiger from Beatrice with David Norris from Peru accompanying. Here are some interesting facts about Freshmore:

- There have been 38 schools participating (some of which are no longer around): Adams; Ashland-Greenwood; Auburn; Beatrice; Conestoga; Crete; Cross County; Dawson/Verdon; Falls City; Falls City Sacred Heart; Freeman; Gretna; Johnson-Brock; Johnson County Central; Lewiston; Lincoln Christian; Lincoln Luther an; Lincoln Northeast; Lincoln Southeast; Louisville; Lourdes Central Catholic; Malcolm; Mead; Meridi an; Nebraska City; Nemaha Valley; Palmyra; Parkview Christian; Pawnee City; Plattsmouth; Southeast Consolidated; Syracuse; Table Rock-Steinhauer; Tecumseh; Wahoo; Waterloo; Waverly; & Yutan.
- There have been a total of 56 different directors who have brought students from those 38 schools.
- A total of 3133 singers have performed (not including guest show choirs) which averages to 149 a year. The high participation was 260 the low was 75. We have had only one cancellation due to weather.
- Four have been held on March 4, three each March 7 & March 8, and two on March 5 (my birthday). While the others have been spread around the month of March with 1 in April.
- 67 different songs have been performed.
- 2 of those songs have been written for us.

March 17 not only brought us St Patrick's Day but also the Middle School Contest Concert at 7:00 pm. The students of the middle school instrumental and vocal departments performed their contest selections. Then the middle school choir competed at the Malcolm Music Contest on March 20 and received a "I-Superior" rating ete in the Malcolm Music Contest on Marchlented show. The Mudecas Music Contest was held in Pawnee City on Tuesday, March 24 and we are happy to report that the JCC Thunderbird Choir received a Superior plaque from the judges (each judge rated us a "I-Superior"). 




