### SUPERINTENDENT NOTES by Jack D. Moles

The school year is off and running. I have yet to talk with anyone (other than parents) who was really ready to start the new school year. Most everyone has commented about how fast the summer flew by. Watching staff and kids in the first few days, however, I know they are all excited to begin a new year. I join them as each year brings new adventures, challenges, and rewards.



As part of my opening with our staff this year I shared with them my theme for the year. The theme around which I want to shape this school year is: "CONNECT:BELIEVE:EXPECT". This theme is built around the concept that we must make positive connections with our students before they can have belief. By this belief I really mean three things: (1) before they can believe in us, (2) before they can believe we believe in them, and most importantly, (3) before we can help them to believe in themselves. Once belief happens, then we can raise our expectations for our students. Raising expectations for all students is a goal that we set before our staff members and of ourselves as a school. We have these positive connections with many of our students, but not necessarily with all of them. That is something we work on every year and this year is no difference. Once these positive connections take place truly wonderful things happen for kids. I want to make sure that we do not overlook any students.

The summer brought a great deal of physical change to the school in terms of grounds and facilities. Highlights include:

- Two restrooms in both the Elementary in Tecumseh and the Middle School in Cook received "extreme makeovers". New tile was placed on the floors and walls, along with all new fixtures and dividers. The aesthetic changes are amazing. The goal is to eventually complete two more restrooms in the Elementary, as well as four restrooms and two locker rooms in the High School. Hopefully these projects can be completed over the next three to five years.
- Several classrooms received new paint. I have developed a schedule that will have all classrooms receive new paint jobs over the next five years. Teachers were allowed to choose their own color(s). Some went very conservative while others went a little "less conservative". We had a crew of aides and students who served as paint crews during the summer and they did a very nice job. We also had the goal of repainting the steps on the stairways in the Elementary and the High School but this project proved to be very time consuming when trying to strip down the existing paint on the steps. Hopefully this project can be completed next summer.
- Some classrooms have received new lighting fixtures. This has dramatically improved lighting in those rooms. As with painting classrooms, my plan is to improve lighting in most classrooms over the next several years. Not only is lighting improved, but the fixtures are also more economical.
- The hot water system was replaced at the Tecumseh site. In the past we ran off of two industrial sized water heaters which used a large storage tank. We replaced them with smaller high efficiency units that should not need the large storage tank.
- Some sidewalk work has been done, with more to be completed. A small sidewalk was extended to the south of the Elementary. A parking area at that site did not have access to the sidewalk without walking on grass so we added the extension.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank those who played a major role in working to complete these projects. Those who worked summer maintenance jobs for us through the entire summer were outstanding in their work. We also had a great deal of volunteer work completed that helped to move things along. To all of you who helped: job well done!

Some other projects are still being planned that will help to improve the conditions of our buildings and grounds. Examples of projects still to come:

- We will be considering roof projects at the Cook site in the next few years. All of the roofs at the Tecumseh site have been addressed over the past several years and now attention needs to turn to the Cook facility. The roof on the old gym was replaced a few years ago, but the others have not been addressed.
- We are in the process of considering a project that would replace a failing steam line to the high school, as well as fixing the chimney coming out of the boiler room at Tecumseh. Hopefully these projects will be completed early this fall.
- We will continue to address painting and lighting in classrooms as we move forward. These projects will be addressed over a series of 4-5 years.
- We have some buildings that need to be removed at both sites. At the Tecumseh site the back modular needs to be removed. This building is no longer active for us due to mold issues. We also have two storage garage sheds at the Cook site. If anyone is interested in removing any or all of these buildings please feel free to contact me.
- A long term goal I have is to replace locks on doors on all classrooms and offices.

Keeping facilities in good shape is, of course, an expensive undertaking. Any homeowner can vouch for that. The Board has done a very good job of supporting the improvement of our buildings. For this purpose we have had a Special Building Fund levy to provide the revenues to address these issues. This fund is not part of the General Fund.

Welcome Back! I hope you had an enjoyable summer and are rejuvenated and ready for a great 2015-2016 school year.

We are excited to announce that Johnson County Central High School is bringing proven ACT preparation to all our college-bound students. Our goal is to help each student get into the best two or four year college at the least amount financially. JCC has purchased the use of John Baylor Test Prep (JBTP) to be used on-line for JCC students either at school or at home.

We are excited to announce that all JCC students ( $9^{th}$ - $12^{th}$  grade) have the option to participate. All participants will be expected to view all 12 sessions (one session = one hour) and to complete all assigned homework (about 20 minutes for each session)

Each student will have full access at school or at home to all the ACT Prep sessions, bonus materials, and college counseling content using their iPad. Students can access the ACT Prep sessions during their study halls or on their own at home.

Bringing the Johns Baylor Test Prep program on-line to JCC district and our communities is an investment by the district in your ACT score: an important measure used for college admission and financial aid. Most Test Prep courses cost hundreds of dollars, JCC student's will have access to the John Baylor Test Prep either at school, or at home, absolutely free of charge.

We truly believe the best and efficient way a student maximizes his/her potential on the ACT test is to take challenging core classes throughout their high school career. The John Baylor Test Prep program is another tool to help students reach their potential on the ACT test. We are excited that Johnson County Central High School students will have an opportunity to receive excellent test preparation. We strongly encourage students to participate and to take advantage of this opportunity.

If you are interested in your student to take the John Baylor Test Prep program, please make sure your students fills out the form they received on August 25 and make sure they return it to the high school office: Once the student turns in this form they will receive a packet for the John Baylor Test Prep program.

Simple things such as asking how their day was, taking an interest in their academic progress or simply making sure their homework is finished can pay huge dividends toward your child's academic success. Hopefully, parents and teachers all have the same goal in mind – for your child to have a successful and productive school year. When parents and teachers work together the students will benefit, making it possible for them to accomplish great things. Junior High football, volleyball and cross country practices are underway with their first contests rapidly approaching. At the start of any season we should take time to think about the purpose of athletics in a Middle School setting. While everyone wants to win and winning is our goal, it cannot be the purpose of our sports program at this level. Middle School activities need to encourage participation and the development of fundamentals that will help them succeed at the varsity level. Instead of placing the emphasis on winning and losing, we need to focus on hard work, effort and teamwork. If students can learn to work hard, give maximum effort, and put team success ahead of individual glory at a young age they are learning skills that will help them succeed for the rest of their lives. Please support our young athletes this year by attending games and cheering their efforts, win or lose.

### **ImPACT Concussion Testing Program**

Johnson County Central is, once again, utilizing the ImPACT Concussion Testing Program for all athletes grades 7-12 to help improve the school's and coaches' care for athletes with sports-related concussions. This program is being provided by Nebraska Orthopaedic & Sports Medicine, and Saint Elizabeth Regional Medical Center of Lincoln, through the Nebraska Sports Concussion Network. The ImPACT Test is an online computerized test that is specifically designed for managing sports-related concussions. The test measures brain reaction time, processing speed, memory, attention, and allows medical professionals to obtain a "snap-shot" of how one's brain functions in normal conditions. Athletes are baseline tested in the pre-season, and if an athlete sustains a head injury, they are re-tested. Post-injury scores are then compared to pre-injury, baseline scores. If differences exist between the baseline and post-injury tests, athletes will be restricted from activity until further test results return to normal. As post-injury scores return to baseline, or normal, this indicates an athlete is recovered sufficiently to resume a step-wise progression back into activity and full participation. This form of testing and return-to-play helps avoid prolonging the recovery from a concussion, and prevents athletes returning to play too soon before the brain has had time to fully heal, risking serious or catastrophic injury.

This year Thunderbird athletes in 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> grades and any new athletes participating in contact sports (football, volleyball, wrestling, boys & girls basketball, and track-jumpers) will be tested. The cost of the baseline testing is being funded and implemented by the Nebraska Sports Concussion Network. Post-Injury testing, if necessary, will be conducted by a health care professional trained in ImPACT and usual office visit charges will likely apply. School personnel have been trained to conduct baseline tests at school, and all coaches will have taken an online Concussion Training for Coaches course in an effort to improve the recognition of potential head injuries. Amazing! I've seen kids outrun the field in track in a pair of old, tattered basketball while the competition was lagging behind in one-hundred dollar, or more, track spikes! How does that happen?!

It happens through hard work. It happens knowing that the curriculum, the bat, the shoes, the offense, the whatever, is just a small part of the equation. One unit of blood given can help save up to three lives!

The entire donation process takes about 1 ¼ hours, from registration through refreshments. The actual donation takes about eight minutes. Drinking plenty of fluids the day of and the day before the donation and eating a good breakfast help ensure a positive experience. Please bring Red Cross Donor Card and/or Picture Identification. Students who are 16 will also need a signed parent consent form to be able to give.

### NWEA-MAP Testing for grades 9-11 on September 10 and 11, 2015:

Johnson County Central students in grades 9, 10, and 11 will be taking the NWEA Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) tests on September 10, and 11. Each student will take a Science, Math, Language Usage, and Reading test. These tests will help teachers and parents have a measure of each student's reading, science, math and language usage skills this fall. This will help students and teachers set learning goals for the school year. Then in the spring, each student will again be taking the MAP assessments to measure the student's progress.

This year JCC will again be using their iPads and the online version of the MAP assessment. This makes the testing a more positive event for students and teachers.

### **Explore It! Career Fair:**

Johnson County Central High School sophomore students will have the opportunity to attend the Explore It! Career Fair! held at the Southeast Community College-Beatrice on September 29. High school students from area schools will also be in attendance.

Sponsored by Nebraska Department of Labor and Southeast Community College, the program will help students plan their futures beyond high school. Mr. Lamarr Womble, Founder of "Passion for Leadership," will be the guest speaker. Students will have the opportunity to visit with future employers, short term training programs, 2-year and 4-year college programs in the career portion of the program.

Sophomore students who are interested in attending will need to complete the Nebraska Career Connections Assessments and register with Mrs. Moles, Counselor. If there is space, other students from JCC may also attend, see Mrs. Moles!

### October College Fairs and Educational Planning Programs:

College fairs allow students (usually grades 9-12) and their parents to visit with representatives from many 4-year and 2-year colleges in one location. Military representatives are also available representing military academies and the armed services. Financial aid sessions at the college fairs offer information on applying for the FAFSA, scholarships, loans, and grants. Educational Planning Programs are similar but usually smaller in size. These programs are FREE to students and parents.

Some tips to follow to make the most of your College Fair experience:

- 1. Prepare a list of questions to ask college representatives, such as the school's academic programs, admission application deadlines, or scholarship opportunities.
- 2. Determine what you are looking for in a college or university you plan to attend. This will help you decide which to look at more closely and perhaps follow-up with a campus tour. Take notes to keep track of the schools that interest you.
- 3. Before you go, register for a college fair barcode! If you plan to attend a College Fair or Educational Planning Program, register for a barcode that will streamline your visits with college representatives. Visit NebraskaCollegeFairs.org and select the event you plan to attend. Complete and submit a confidential online form providing details such as contact information, age/gender/ethnicity, year in school, academic information, extracurricular activities, and ACT/SAT scores. Print the barcode that appears on your screen. Important! Take the barcode to the College Fair(s) and/or EPP(s) you attend. College representatives participating in the barcode/scanner process will scan your barcode to retrieve your information-and you won't have to complete information cards!

### Access College Early (ACE) Scholarship Program:

Authorized by the Nebraska Legislature in 2007, the Access College Early (ACE) Scholarship Program Act (LB 192) pays tuition and mandatory fees for qualified, low-income high school students to enroll in college courses from Nebraska's colleges or universities, either through dual-enrollment or early enrollment agreements with these institutions. High school student may apply for funding under this program by completing the ACE Student Application, which is reviewed by the Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education (CCPE) for award consideration.

There are two basic criteria for high school students to qualify for the ACE Scholarship. Students must either be eligible to receive assistance under a variety of federal government programs or the student and his or her family must have experienced a recent hardship.

For students to find out more information on the ACE Scholarship and to complete an application, please go to <a href="https://www.ccpe.state.ne.us">www.ccpe.state.ne.us</a> or see Mrs. Moles. Students must create an account, then complete and submit an online form.

### **Scheduling a Campus Visit:**

Seniors and their parents may wish to schedule a campus visit to help make a decision about which college or university to attend. The following are some hints to help:

- 1. Please schedule your visit in advance some colleges do regular morning and afternoon tours, some only on certain days. Some colleges offer preview days for particular majors. Call the Admissions Office of the college you are interested in and request a campus tour or you may be able to schedule a visit online (Mrs. Moles is available for help). If possible, arrange for a meeting with faculty in your intended major or with coaches about a particular sport.
- Seniors should bring a written request from a parent for the college visit that states date, the college visiting, and
  time of tour and submit it in advance to the Principal's office. Seniors will receive a make-up slip to let teachers know
  they intend to be absent. This allows missed classroom work to be made up before the absence.

### **Juniors and PSAT Testing:**

The PSAT-NMSQT (Preliminary SAT –National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test) is scheduled for Wednesday morning, October 14, at Johnson County Central High School. The PSAT is an optional test. Juniors may choose to take the PSAT/NMSQT because it allows students to measure their skills in critical reading, verbal reasoning, writing and math problem solving, to compare their academic skills with those of other college-bound students, and to enter the National Merit Scholarship Corporation programs.

Juniors who are interested in knowing more about the PSAT test and its opportunities may request a copy of "Official Student Guide to the PSAT/NMSQT" from Mrs. Moles. They can then decide if they wish to take the PSAT and enter competition for the National Merit Scholarship.

High ability sophomore students may also take the PSAT by registering and paying the testing fee. Taking the PSAT as a sophomore may help students prepare for the PSAT /NMSQT as juniors. Sophomores who are interested in taking the PSAT should request an "Official Student Guide to the PSAT/NMSQT."

All students who wish to take the PSAT, need to register with Mrs. Moles by October 1 and pay the \$15.00 testing fee. A limited number of fee waivers may be available for qualifying junior students.

### Mark Your Calendar - Financial Aid Meeting at JCC for Parents, Seniors and Juniors:

Johnson County Central will be hosting the EducationQuest Financial Aid meeting for juniors, seniors and their parents at the high school on November 10 at 6:00 p.m. The meeting will last about one hour. More information to follow next month.

### **Student Records and Release of Information:**

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a Federal law that requires Johnson County Central School, with certain exceptions, to obtain a parent's written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from a child's education records. However, Johnson County Central School may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless parents have advised the District to the contrary.

The primary purpose of directory information is to allow Johnson County Central School to include directory information from a child's education records in certain school publications. Examples include:

- 1. A music program showing a student's name and grade;
- 2. The annual yearbook;
- 3. Honor roll or other recognition lists:
- 4. Graduation programs;
- 5. Sports activity sheets, such as football, volleyball, or basketball programs showing weight and height of team members.

Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, two federal laws require local educational agencies (LEA) receiving assistance in the *Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military recruiters upon request, with three directory information categories – names, addresses, and telephone listings – unless parents have advised the LEA that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent.* 

If you do <u>not</u> want Johnson County Central School to disclose directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, you must <u>notify the District in writing by September 15, 2015</u>. Please direct your request to Mr. Moles or your student's building principal. Johnson County School has designated the following information as directory information:

- -Student name
- -Address
- -Telephone listing
- -Photograph
- -Grade level
- -Dates of attendance
- -Participation in officially recognized activities and sports
- -Weight and height of members of athletic teams
- -Honors and awards received
- -The most recent educational agency or institution attended.

Parents and students wishing Johnson County Central School to release additional information contained in a student's education record to outside agencies need to present a <u>signed</u>, <u>written request</u> or complete the appropriate student record release form.

### Requesting a High School Transcript:

<u>Current High School Students</u> applying for postsecondary institutions, educational programs and scholarships need to bring a written request signed by student and parent to Johnson County Central School in order for a transcript or other information such as class rank, grade point average, or ACT/SAT score to be released. Transcript Request Forms may be picked up from the guidance office and are available on the JCC Website (under forms).

<u>Graduates</u> of Johnson County Central Public Schools, Elk Creek Schools, Nemaha Valley Schools or Tecumseh Public School need to submit a <u>written request</u> stating: a) information to send (such as a transcript of grades), b) the year of graduation and/or attendance (such as graduated 2012), c) name and address of institution or program to receive requested information and finally, the printed name <u>and</u> signature of the former student making the request. Requests may be mailed (Johnson County Central High School, Attn: Mrs. Shelley Moles, 358 N. 6<sup>th</sup> Street, Tecumseh, NE 68450) or given to Mrs. Moles in the counselor's office.

The Thunderbird Way also encourages students to be positive leaders. All students are leaders and can help those around them make appropriate behavior choices through their example. The purpose of a positive behavior program is to support and promote appropriate and exceptional behaviors. To encourage positive behaviors, staff members may compliment students with their choice or provide students with ticket which can be used for rewards in both the elementary and middle school. There are many ways students demonstrate positive behavior choices. It may be when a student picks up trash in the hall, is kind to another student who needs a friend, or when a student brings their homework every day. A component of the Johnson County Central mission statement is to create lifelong learners. The Thunderbird Way provides students the tools they need to be successful at school and life by promoting safety, responsibility, education, respect and leadership.

Last year the school received funding through the Johnson County Coalition from a Region V Federal Block Grant to purchase posters for the Tecumseh elementary and Cook site as well as a welcome banner for each building. The new posters look awesome throughout the halls of the buildings. They will serve as a wonderful reminder to help students make responsible and respectful choices when at school.

The Mission of TeamMates *is to positively impact the world by inspiring youth to reach their full potential through mentoring*. Established in 1991 by Tom and Nancy Osborne, TeamMates was formed in an effort to provide support and encouragement to school-aged youth. The goal is to see youth graduate from high school and pursue post-secondary education. TeamMates has touched the lives of thousands of youth and currently provides a mentor for more than 7,000 youth across 131 chapters in Iowa and Nebraska.

The impact of the TeamMates match on the mentee is profound.

- 54% of mentees showed improved academic achievement after being matched with their mentor.
- 85% maintain or experience fewer disciplinary referrals at school.
- 75% maintained or had fewer unexcused absences.

More than 95% of mentees report that they are happy when they meet with their mentor, that their mentor talks to them about what they do well, they feel important when they are with their mentor and that they trust their mentor.

Data collection from Gallup's Clifton Strengths Project has helped affirm what TeamMates had already believed to be true:

- Strengths-based mentoring positively influences student engagement with school.
- Students in the control group who received no strengths training as part of their mentoring program were significantly less likely to strongly agree that they looked forward to seeing their mentor over time.
- There is a positive correlation between a student looking forward to seeing their mentor and overall levels of hope, engagement and well-being.

TeamMates has been recognized as a "Best Practice" mentoring organization which means the structure, policy and procedures are in place for a safe and consistent program. TeamMates adheres to *the Elements of Effective Practice* which were developed by the National Mentoring Partnership as the national standards for running a quality mentoring program.


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
